Council rejects trash bids; to readvertise

City Council rejected all trash bids at its regular meeting Monday night. The City will readvertise for bids for one year.

The action was taken after the lowest bid of \$1200 per month from Robert Crump, Millersburg, was accepted for one year. Crump wanted a two-year contract so the motion was withdrawn.

The high bid of \$1400 per month was submitted by Kenneth Inman and Bob Barnett, the present trash collectors. Council decided the new contract should be accepted at the April 14 meeting of Council to take effect May 1.

Hospital discussion March 18 to explore community needs

Nicholas countians will meet March 18 to discuss the county hospital. That session, scheduled for 7:30 p.m. at the Methodist Church Fellowship Hall, is a follow-up of a community health forum held here in Carlisle Feb. 18.

Present at the March 18 meeting will be panelists who are "experts" in the area of concern. Responding to questions about the hospital will be Mrs. Alma Cloyd, Acting Administrator of the Hospital, Ted Henaker, the Hospital Auditor, Tom Strood from Blue Cross-Blue Shield, and Dan Tuttle from the Health Resources Development Institute in Lexington, Harry Jobe, representative from Kentucky Hospital Association and Jerry Owen, representative from Hospital Management Section, University of Kentucky.

The Nicholas county representative on the Bluegrass Regional Health Planning Council Dr. Grieve Edgerton. At the Feb. 18 session, initiated through the Bluegrass Regional Health Planning Council, Inc., hospital staffers and area residents outlined questions about the facility and asked what could be done.

Staffers pointed out that the hospital serves Bath, Robertson and sometimes

Administrator search
can begin at Home

The Johnson-Mathers Home, Inc., Board of Directors can now begin its active search and evaluation of applicants for the vacant position of Administrator of the Nicholas County Hospital and the Johnson-Mathers Nursing Home. The Reverend Herman B. Kaulage, Board chairman, has received the current requirements of the Commission on Health Care for an administrator of a licensed nursing home, as described below.

There are no state requirements for a hospital administrator.

Father Kaulage stated that the Board of Directors hope that, in keeping with the wishes of the citizens of Nicholas county, an Administrator can be hired from local county applicants, but for the welfare of the health care for both the hospital and nursing home patients the best possible applicant must be given first choice.

According to the Kentucky Board of Licensure for Nursing Home Administrators the following requirements are defined in statutes and rules governing the hiring of an administrator:

1. Written application on forms provided by the Board.

*2. 21 years of age;

*3. Citizen of the United States and has established bona fide residency or expressed intent to reside in Kentucky, unless employed by a health care facility located in Kentucky;

*4. Character references;

*5. Completed 64 college semester hours in equivalent courses deemed suitable for preparation for nursing home administration by the Board. However, for a period of six months effective Nov. 13, 1974 through May 13, 1975, the Board approved experience as an administrator of a health facility or service may be
