"impossible" to get a private room and that beds must be set up in the halls. A hospital board member pointed out that the acute care facility and a local nursing home care run as one corporation. The nursing home is not reimbursed sufficiently through state aid programs to pay for the care and drugs and patients need to be subsidized.

So, the hospital has had to subsidize the home with \$100,000 that might have been used to combat some of the hospital's equipment and space problems.

But Charles Cox pointed out that the fiscal court sees the two facilities, while serving different needs, as one corporation. It does not look at their financial situations separately.

The hospital building never has been acceptable, he added, and a new one should be built. But funding is a major obstacle to that proposal.

Tony Goetz, Health Planning Council director, told the group that the state probably would not approve an application for additional hospital beds in Nicholas county. Federal funding for a new facility also might be difficult to obtain, he said.

But he suggested that the group take a closer look at the problem. Expertise is available through the Kentucky Hospital Association and the University of Kentucky, as well as the Council, he said.

Dr. Grace Eldison, Nicholas county's representative on the non-profit Council which serves 17 counties, said that federal Professional Standards and Review Organization (PSRO) legislation will require reviews of many hospital admissions and length of stay. It could affect future utilization rates of all hospitals.

"One thing that decongests hospitals and makes costs less is a home health agency," she added. Such agencies can send nurses, therapists and other health care personnel into a patient's home to provide services on a regular basis.

The Welch district health department now serving Nicholas, Bourbon, Harrison and Scott counties, may be providing such services within a few months.

The group voted to meet again on March 18 to examine the problem further. They will consider how many patients are treated locally and how many transferred; what the average length of stay is; what projected needs and costs are; whether the existing hospital could be remodeled or whether a new building is needed.

It was suggested that in future meetings the group also might consider adult day care programs as a complement to nursing home services, and mental health-mental retardation

Rumor termed 'Cruel Hoax'

A rumor stating there is an insurance dividend due veterans of World War II from the year 1948 seems to be nearing its head again in the midwest, as the VA insurance center in St. Paul, Minn., is receiving inquiries. There is no such dividend and it has been termed a "cruel hoax" by the VA. During the past year 2,611 veterans wrote the VA about the supposed dividend, and since the rumor first started making the rounds in 1969 the VA has had to answer 309,500 letters on the subject. News media and service organizations have been asked for help in discounting the rumor.
