**Herbicides**  
In the coming weeks farmers will be purchasing and storing herbicides for use during the approaching growing season. The proper and safe storage of herbicides will result in longer shelf life, chemical stability, the possibility of poisoning to humans and livestock and prevent environmental contamination.

Some of the vegetables can be safely stored in a well ventilated area where the temperature can be controlled. Preferably, the herbicides should be stored in a separate building; however, isolated storage rooms are usually adequate. For safety to all concerned, the building or storage room should be locked at all times, except when in use. Herbicide formulations such as dusts, wettable powders and granules are usually packaged in paper of some type. When wet, these packaging materials may deteriorate. In addition, when these formulations are usually become solidified and not usable. Herbicides should be stored in an area that will not freeze. At low temperatures, the chemical in emulsifiable concentrates and liquids can crystallize out of solution, and may not go into solution later when the temperature increases. As a precaution, it is best to store herbicides in an area where the temperature never gets below 45 degrees. Herbicide deterioration can also occur at high temperatures. The chemicals can expand at these higher temperatures and could rupture their container, thus resulting in loss of the product.

Always store herbicides in their original container with the label intact and legible. Most accidental poisonings and misuse of herbicides occur when the material has been placed into another container—such as soft drink bottles, quart jars, etc. Do not store herbicides near food, feed, seed or fertilizer.

### Highway funds may be received

FRANKFORT—Central Kentucky may be receiving as much as \$23 million of the recently released \$2 billion in federal highway funds, according to the Kentucky Department of Transportation.

Gov. Julian Carroll has applied for a total of \$9 million for statewide projects.

Approximately 80 per cent of the money will be utilized for construction projects, while the remainder will be spent for design, utility projects and right of way for projects such as the Jefferson Freeway (KY 401) and Cane Run Road in Jefferson county and US 60S 27 between Lexington and Paris.

If all projects are approved, state matching funds could bring the total to \$5 million. Several Central Kentucky interstate projects could be carried out, such as safety improvements on I-75 in Fayette county, bridge improvements on I-63 in Jefferson county and work on the Kennedy Bridge, as well as its intersection range, as well as its intersection with US 60.

Other highway projects in the central part of the state would include construction on sections of KY 55 in Springfield in Washington county and KY 58 near Mather's Mill.

The federal funds must be matched on a 90-10 basis by the state on interstate construction and matched 75-25 on other highway projects. Kentucky's share was funded earlier when Gov. Carroll's \$115 million in state funds available.

## Kentucky reflections

The State Legislature has been considered by some political scientists to be useful laboratories for experiment. New ideas may be considered and tested by the state before moving to the national scene.

Public financing of elections might have probably been tried in states as a preliminary step before moving to the national scene. An interim subcommittee of the Kentucky Legislature considered and drafted a bill in 1973 for public financing of the governor's race, but the committee's interest in the subject was dimmed by the 1974 session failed to bring out the bill.

On Aug. 8, 1974, the day Mr. Nixon resigned, the Federal House of Representatives approved legislation providing for the public financing of future presidential elections. The Senate had already passed similar legislation in April and Nixon had made their own strong opposition. The bill was duly signed on Oct. 15 by President Ford.

The public revelation of the enormous expenditures in the 1972 presidential campaign contributed substantially to the enactment of the bill. The ever growing use of television and advertising techniques throughout the days of Truman and before has greatly increased the cost of election. It has been the belief of many careful observers that many successful candidates enter office as obligated to their major financial backers that public welfare must inevitably suffer; that the citizens' interest is subordinated to those of special interests because these special interests provide the funds that in each of 30 states. Total spending of primary candidates is limited to 15 million dollars.

These ceilings provide serious constitutional problems, since it can be argued that to deny a person a right to advertise as a candidate, or to publish or distribute literature, may be an infringement on freedom of speech. Some voters resist the use of public

major or minor depends on the percentage of vote received by that party in the previous general election. It may also seriously handicap the formation of significant new alliances. This provision needs careful monitoring, lest it tend to lock the system into a rigid and unresponsive posture.

The statute also limits individual donations in primaries to \$1000 and organizational contributions to \$500; but provides for public funds to match private contributions of up to \$250, provided the candidate raises \$500 in contributions of \$500 or less in each of 30 states. Total spending of primary candidates is limited to 15 million dollars.

A repetition of the financial corruption of the 1972 campaign may be avoided by this statute.

The Congress may have provided the experimental legislation which the states may wish to imitate, if the scheme works. It is bold and daring. Let us hope that it may also be successful.
