## Kay's Kitchen

If you are serving the traditional ham for your Easter dinner, it is time to know that you can buy ham in most any size from a small boneless piece, "just for two" or the whole thing. You can buy it in directions and do take that extra bit of time to give you a ham that is beautiful plus. You may use orange marmalade for a quick and delicious glaze or a mixture of dry mustard, brown sugar, vinegar, and ground cloves. and sprinkle generously with chopped parsley. Do add salt when cooking.

Should you be lucky enough to find fresh green peas in the shell, by all means use them. Add one piece of shell when cooking for extra flavor. Cook with either a sprig of two of mint or of tarragon and a sprig of thyme. Salt to taste and one teaspoon oil.

For a salad use fresh ones. On a bed of Bibb lettuce arrange diced fresh pineapple, sliced pear halves and a few strawberries. Use a dressing of mayonnaise thinned slightly with fruit juice and add a few of lemon juice.

Dessert should be something special. Why not make individual nutmegs and fill with ice cream, and serve with different toppings. Most all of us have a preserve server of two or three divisions which would be an attractive way to serve the toppings. If not, freeze individual dishes placed on a tray and passed would answer the purpose.

**MERINGUES**

4 egg whites  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 cup finely granulated sugar  
1/2 teaspoon vanilla  
Beat egg whites until frothy;

springle salt over top and beat until soft; gradually beat in 4 cups sugar, adding 2 tablespoons at a time. Flavoring, then the remaining sugar, with a spoon shape in mounds on ungreased, paper covered baking sheet. With back of spoon push sides up, making an indentation in each meringue to hold filling you will be using. When shaped bake in slow oven 75 degrees for 45 to 60 minutes; or until delicately browned and dry on top. Remove from paper while warm. Store in an airtight container until time to use. May be made several days ahead.

Since Easter is usually the first spring entertaining, be sure to keep everything bright and colorful. It is no time to put on the lemon yellow and the bright red and blue. Your Easter dinner make the centerpiece using the bright colored egg mixer with white frosting. If you have thought ahead you may have lovely floral centerpieces in a sunny window that may be rearranged for a centerpiece.

Put the hard boiled eggs for supper, either plain or deviled.
