Jane Tackitt was given maternity leave from April 28 to May 26.

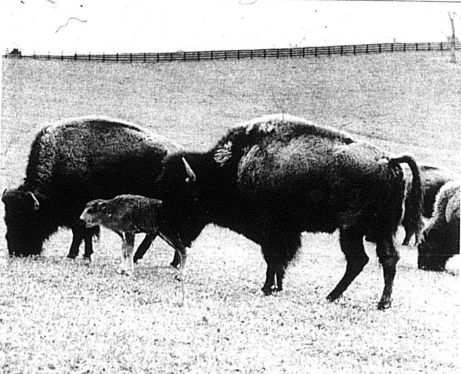
The board was notified by Supt. Elder that a school bus driver's clinic will be held at the elementary school Aug. 5-6.
