Fishing improves after recent heavy rains

Fishing is improving again across Kentucky after heavy rains and high winds all but halted activity late last week. The lake-by-lake rundown, according to the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources: **Greens:** Crappie fair to good in timbered coves; black bass slow to fair casting medium to deep runners of timbered coves in inlets and bays; below dam, trout fair; musky to muddy, falling, four feet above summer pool and 50 degrees. **Blackburn:** Crappie slow over submerged cover; muddy, rising, 13 feet above summer pool and 60 degrees. **Graysay:** No activity; muddy, stable at 13 feet above summer pool and 52 degrees. **Fishtrap:** Crappie good over submerged cover and around stick-ups; musky to muddy, stable at five feet below summer pool and 54 degrees. **Cumberland:** Crappie fair to good drift fishing minnows over submerged cover; black bass fair casting spinners and still fishing the head of creeks; on activity on the South Fork; clear to muddy to muddy, stable, 15 feet above summer pool and 64 degrees. **Herrington:** Black bass fair jigging deep banks at night; white bass fair on the Dix River; clear to murky to muddy, stable at 14 feet above summer pool and 60 degrees. **Dale Hollow:** Black bass good casting shallow banks and still fishing rocky points with minnows; white bass fair to good casting spinners in inlets and bays; clear to murky to muddy, stable at one foot below summer pool and 64 degrees. **Kentucky:** Crappie fair to good still fishing brush line and drop-offs; black bass fair to good casting spinners; bays of points; below dam, crappie and sauger slow; murky, falling, one foot below summer pool and 58 degrees. **Wolin:** Black bass fair to excellent casting deep runners over submerged cover; crappie fair to good still fishing and jigging stick-ups; Dog Creek clear;

murky to muddy, stable three feet above summer pool and 58 degrees; **Barkley:** Crappie good still fishing black and bays and shoreline brush; black bass fair casting medium runners along brushy shoreline; below dam, crappie good and white bass fair; clear to murky to muddy, stable at one foot below summer pool and 64 degrees. **Cave Run:** Black bass slow to fair casting spinner baits and still fishing nightrunners in inlets and bays; bluegill slow in inlets and bays; clear to murky to muddy, eight feet above summer pool and 62 degrees. **Laurel:** Black bass good casting surface and medium runners in timbered coves; bluegill good in same areas; clear, stable at power pool and 66 degrees.
