### Carroll better prepared

(Kentucky News) Her perhaps at no time in memory has there been so much correct choice in electing Kentucky's next governor.

Certainly no voter can question the obvious fact that the state is at a point in its history when decisions must be made. Those decisions will determine largely whether Kentucky solves its obvious problems and takes full advantage of even more obvious opportunities.

In all fairness to the next governor, it should be said that there have been fewer times when a more difficult course faced the state's chief executive than that expected during the next four years.

Aside from the expected but very real needs of education, agriculture, business, health, etc., the next governor is likely to be faced with the need to deal with the state's economic drains on the state's revenues. At a time when human needs are the greatest, the state's financial ability to help could be diminished.

But the immediate future could also present unparalleled opportunities for progress for Kentucky, with its huge coal resources, and its agriculture base to help it meet the world's needs.

Kentucky is fortunate indeed that the state's next leader will be a man who serves a full four-year term in the state's highest office. No man could enter that office better prepared than the man who would be expected to succeed the man who has been in the office for more than two decades.

He will have completed a very difficult transitional year since assuming the governor's office when former Gov. Wendell Ford won U.S. Senate seat last November.

## Lieutenant governor race stirs interest with 11 candidates

FRANKFORT—The contest for lieutenant governor in 1975 government session is the only race stirring much interest among the voters of the state.

Here we have 11 candidates vying for the nomination while Gov. Julian Carroll seems to have a lock on the nomination for governor for a full four-year term beginning in 1978. Gov. Gable has only desultory opposition in the Republican primary.

Not only has he won his first political race at age 29 and began a series of terms as state representative that saw the state's economy overtake the nation's of the House. He made lieutenant governor in December 1969, and was sworn in as governor in December, 1970.

Carroll seems a leader and as such we think is obviously best for the state and for the nation as a whole.

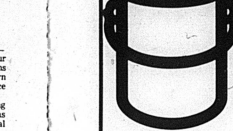

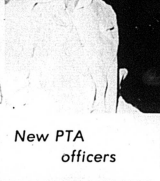
