INSPECTION PERIOD FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The NICHOLAS County property tax roll will be opened for inspection from June 2 through June 6, 1975. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of his deputies, any property owner may inspect the tax roll to check the assessment of his property and compare it with the assessment of comparable property to determine whether it is equitably assessed. The tax roll may not be inspected for any other purpose.

This is the January 1, 1975 assessment on which state, county, and school taxes for 1975 will be due on September 15, 1975.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours 8:30 A.M. and 4:30 P.M.
