as one of the ten outstanding superintendents in the state. In four Regular Sessions and two Special Sessions of the General Assembly, Mrs. McNamara served on eight committees and was chairman of the Elections Committee. She sponsored, co-sponsored and voted for bills improving public health, mental health, agriculture, air pollution, conserving, raising pay for election officers, teacher retirement, 20 year teacher service retirement, changing the governor's budget in 1970 and putting fifteen million seven hundred thousand dollars in teacher salaries and retirement. In 1971 Special Session, she sponsored two important resolutions. One was changing Daylight Time to run from Memorial Day to Labor Day and the second one dealt with college disorders.

Mrs. McNamara is active in civic life in Montgomery county. She is a member of the Mary Childs Hospital auxiliary and was the first member to receive a thousand hour pin for volunteer service, member of the Business Women's Honor Roll, Farm Bureau, Director of Women's Civil Defense, member of Natural Bridge Park Board, executive member of Kentucky's Historical Society and Americanism chairman of the American Legion Auxiliary.
