Bishop Ackerman to visit Shrine Church May 27

The parishioners of the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe will be honored on May 27 with the presence of the Most Reverend Richard H. Ackerman, Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Covington. On this occasion Bishop Ackerman will make his official parish visitation and confer the Sacrament of Confirmation.

Confirmation may be compared with the Jewish Bar Mitzvah, at which time a youth is accepted into the adult community of the faithful. During the ceremony of Confirmation the young adult will confirm their commitment to Christ. The Bishop will seal this commitment by anointing them with blessed oil and by invoking the Holy Spirit to descend upon them recalling the coming of the Holy Spirit upon Christ's disciples on Pentecost Sunday. Lastly, the Bishop will charge the Confirmation candidates to go forth to be witnesses for Christ in the world today.

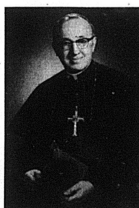
The annual Dairy Meeting of the 9th District was held in the Flemingsburg Library recently to make plans for the annual June Dairy month activities.

Supt. Elder appoints parents to Citizens Advocacy Council

Don Elder, Superintendent of Nicholas County Schools, appointed over 50 parents to a Citizens Advocacy Committee Thursday night at its first meeting. The approximately 16 teachers who attended the meeting will serve in a supporting capacity. The immediate concern of the group is the election of those candidates who will be willing to support elementary and secondary education.

The program for improving elementary-secondary education proposed by the Citizens' Advisory Council does not call for a tax increase. Surplus funds, current revenue collecting, which are in excess of estimates, and Federal revenue sharing funds can be used if citizens can convince legislators it is of top priority.

Kentucky is 49th in elementary-secondary education. But, the state ranks 26th in higher education; 29th in welfare; and 11th in highways. Our parks system has gained international recognition.

The games will be played on Monday evenings at the Nicholas County High School.

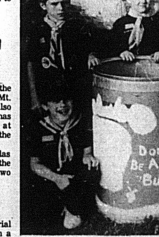
Any church interested in forming a league is invited to contact the association.

Hospital-Nursing Home administrator is named

Kenneth W. Urlage, Assistant Administrator of Roseale Manor, a 200 bed nursing home facility in Kenton county, has been unanimously selected for the position of Administrator of the Johnson-Mathers Nursing Home and Nicholas County Hospital.

The Board of the Johnson-Mathers Home, Inc. made the decision at its regular meeting May 13 after a lengthy discussion of the qualifications and personal impressions of the applicants for the position vacated by John Morris. Urlage was born Aug. 29, 1946, the third of seven children, to Mr. and Mrs. Arthur W. Urlage of Latonia, Covington. He attended Holy Cross Elementary and High School, Northern Kentucky Area Vocational School and graduated this spring from Northern Kentucky State College with a B.S. degree in Business Administration having concentrated in the area of Business Management. He was on the Dean's List his final semester of college.

Urlage served in the United States Marine Corps from Sept. 1968, until Aug. 1970. His active service was spent at the U.S. missile site in 29 Palms, Calif.; the State Department, Washington, D.C.; and at the American Embassy, Saigon, Vietnam. He was awarded the decorations of National Defense Ribbon, Vietnam Service Medal, Vietnam Campaign Medal with six stars, Combat Action Ribbon, and Good Conduct Medal. When released from active duty he held the rank of sergeant.

Urlage married Deborah Sue Kuhn of Southgate, on Aug. 20, 1971. They have a year old daughter, Stephanie, 10, and are expecting their second child momentarily. Mr. and Mrs. Urlage are presently residing in Latonia, Ohio and are active members of Holy Cross Catholic Church.

Urlage will assume the duties of Administrator of our local health care facilities early in June as soon as he can get his family settled. May grand jury returns two indictments; praises court

The May Circuit Court Grand Jury returned the two indictments referred to it for consideration during the two days it was in session.

The Fiscal Court was commended for the "farsighted actions in redecorating the courthouse."

Other observations and recommendations, signed by the jury foreman, Sherry Claver, were:

The Nicholas County Blood Donor Program will hold its next mobile blood drawing on Tuesday, May 27 from 2:00 p.m. till 5:30 p.m. and from 6:30 p.m. till 8:00 p.m. at the First Baptist Church in Carlisle.

Nicholas county is just short of the amount of blood donations it needs to guarantee total blood coverage, which fulfills all the necessary blood for all county residents anywhere in the United States. However, to begin and maintain this type of county-wide coverage, the cooperation of every healthy person in the county is needed.

Each and every resident of Nicholas county between the ages of 18 and 65 is urged to join the blood program and donate one pint of blood each year. Every individual that donates blood immediately assures total blood coverage for one year for himself, his spouse, all his dependent children, his parents and his parents-in-law.
