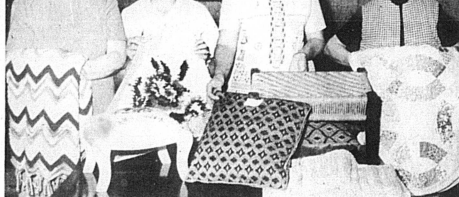

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No system of automated voting is superior --LRC

No system of automated voting is superior to all others, each system has strong and weak points, a survey by the Legislative Research Commission (LRC) concludes. The desirability of one voting method over another depends on many factors, accuracy in tabulating results being the most important, the report says. The report entitled "Mechanical Voting Recording: A Survey" was prepared by LRC staff member Marcha A. Moloney. Copies are available free upon request by contacting the Legislative Research Commission, State Capitol, Frankfort, Ky. 40601. Senate Resolution 74 of the 1974 session directed the LRC to study electronic voting systems and present findings prior to the 1976 session. The report compares the pluses and minuses of three methods of casting and counting votes — lever voting machines, currently used throughout Kentucky, optical scan systems and computerized punch card systems. Lever voting machines are acknowledged generally as providing the fastest and most efficient method of voting but require much preparation prior to election day, the report says. Localities using computerized voting methods have experienced more problems than those which rely on non-computerized systems, the report says. The chance for fraud also is increased when electronic systems are used, it says. Cost shouldn't be the only factor considered in deciding which system to use, the report cautions. Other factors should include accuracy of result, protection against overvoting, rapidly

Newspapers' clipping files to be accessible to others

The Courier-Journal and Louisville Times Co. has announced that it will make the newspapers' clipping files accessible to business, institutions, government agencies and libraries through a microfilm system that will be operated by computer. Users of the system will have special microfilm copies that could have been filed early from the Courier-Journal and Louisville Times data base but had no adequate way to get access to the newspapers' files. "A combination microfilm and computer index system will be tremendously important in fulfilling information requests made to the state Department of Library and Archives," he said. The newspapers' microfilm-computer system will be available through a newly established Center for Journalism and Louisville Times Information Center. The Center was established to make the newspapers' business, institutions, government agencies and libraries in Kentucky and Southern Indiana. Kentucky State Librarian Charles F. Hinds said his agency hopes to obtain the system with a portion of a Title I federal Library Services and Construction Act grant totaling \$277,726 which has just been made available. Hinds said the agency's Courier-Journal and Louisville Times Co. contract would include purchase of necessary equipment for that agency, as well as microfilm, telephone charges, maintenance, training and support.

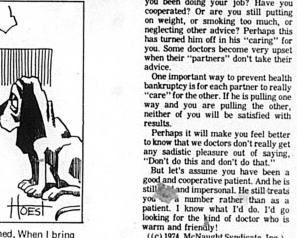
