Blue Grass Industries personnel raise over \$10,000 for Cancer

Blue Grass Industries and Blue Grass Knitting personnel has raised over \$10,000 for the American Cancer Research Society, a charity for which they work hard each year.

The goal of the Nicholas County 1975 Cancer Crusade, under the chairmanship of Mrs. Dorothy Kimberling, was \$15,000.00. Blue Grass employees, totaling 1,877 in the six plants, raised \$10,634.22.

The Carlisle BGI plant brought in \$2,610.00. Mt. Sterling, \$2,447.88; Paris, \$2,307.27; Cynthiana, \$1,743.12; Maysville, \$80.93; and Keokuk, \$68.13.

In the local BGI plant special recognition has been given to Sue Lester's Breast Unit for raising the most money (\$361.77); and Eugene Gance's Cutting Unit, raising the most money per capita (\$217.80 with only 17 in unit).

The fund-raising ideas carried out by local plant employees were unique and varied.

One employee donated two \$25 Savings Bonds which were raffled off. The winner of one of the bonds turned it back in for raffling again and an additional \$0 was raised.

Two garbage cans were filled with grocery items donated by employees; the value being \$30 for one can and \$25 for the other. These were raffled off.

Many bake sales were held with cakes being donated. A terrarium and antique vase and dish were raffled.

A lions sale was conducted with new sheets and pillow cases being brought in by employees.

Among the office staff and supervisors, a penny per pound weight, and age was collected.

A cake raffle was held bringing in \$111.50. The same cake was then auctioned for \$25.

Employees contributed a Sunday road race car wash, a tractor-trailer pulled in with the driver offering \$5 for their services.

Jonathan Craig, area Cancer representative, has commended employees of Blue Grass Industries and Blue Grass Knitting for their efforts in raising such large contributions.
