White corn survey to be continued

The Senate passed a resolution sponsored by Senator Walter Dee Huddleston urging that the Agriculture Department's annual white corn survey not be discontinued, as has been proposed.

Huddleston, who said the annual survey is necessary for market stability, pointed out that Kentucky is the nation's top white corn producing state—with several thousand farmers growing 10.5 million bushels in 1974.

The cash value of Kentucky's white corn crop varies between \$2 and \$0 million.

"The statistical data compiled by the Department of Agriculture in its annual surveys have provided valuable assistance to producers, handlers and processors," Huddleston said as the chairman of the Agriculture subcommittee on marketing, production and stabilization of prices.

Huddleston's resolution was supported by Senator Herman Tammage, committee chairman and senator from the state of Georgia, the nation's number two corn producing state.

"Tax rates may be reduced to offset an increase in the total assessment in the county and school districts."

"Following a reworking of the tax roll, an inspection period for property owners must be held and the local Tax Appeals Board convened for hearing of appeals."

This information being received from the Kentucky Department of Revenue, Frankfort.

Reassessment is now underway, said Anderson, and it anticipated to be completed within four to six weeks. He also stated the consideration of the exemption allowed by the Agricultural and Horticulture Amendment, would possibly be administered as additional assessment to bring the county within the requirements of the Constitution, with no additional increase of taxes, other than what had already been increased earlier this year.
