### Willhoit named to Justice Dept.

FRANKFORD—Henry L. Mangoot, secretary of the Department of Justice (DOJ), has announced the appointment of Anthony M. (Tony) Willhoit to the newly created position of DOJ deputy secretary.

"We are extremely fortunate to have Willhoit back in the justice department," said Mangoot. "His knowledge, experience and the respect which he enjoys throughout the state will be great assets in the continuing effort to make the department more effective and its services available to more people."

"I intend to rely heavily on him in a number of important and sensitive activities. I simply could not be more pleased that we were able to persuade Tony to come back into public service."

"People don't realize how much work is thrown on the secretary," said Willhoit, "and often he must spread himself awfully thin... Hopefully I can provide that needed extra hand."

Although he will assist the secretary in all areas of the department, Willhoit says most of his work will involve assisting the Policy, Research, Overview, Budget, Evaluation (PROBE) unit. That unit is currently providing the nucleus for analyzing Kentucky's criminal justice problems and making recommendations for long-range program priorities, standards and goals to be presented to the 1976 General Assembly.

The 38-year-old Versailles native was the state Public Defender from October, 1972 until last February. Aside from having his own private law practice, Willhoit has been a member of the state crime commission, county attorney for Woodford county and city attorney and judge for the city

### Jr. Varsity team ends season with 6 to 2 record

The Junior Varsity football team finished their season with a 6-2 win over West Carter Monday night. Their record was six wins and two losses. Losses were to Lewis County and Mt. Sterling while victories were over Montgomery County, Jessamine County, Harrison County, Bath County, M.M.I. and West Carter. The freshmen scored 130 points to their opponents 47.

Fullback Handy Hunter and quarterback Mark Russell captured the junior high. Russell completed 17 of 35 passes during the season with four going for touchdowns and six being intercepted. Hunter shared running duties with Jimmy Price and Greg Wills and each scored five touchdowns during the season. Price was the leading scorer with 22 points. The leading pass receiver was Tim Dekeraman with at least one reception in each game and a total of 11 receptions for 168 yards. Berry and Wills were the other good receivers. Tim Moreland did the kicking, averaging 27 yards on 11 punts and kicking three extra points.

Mike Berry also kicked an extra point and scored three safeties during the season as well as running the only touchdown on a kick return.

Defensive leader was Jeff Elder with 40 tackles. Berry was right behind him with 32 tackles. Interceptions, fumble recoveries, blocked punts, and frequent sacks of the opponent's quarterbacks were the order of the day.

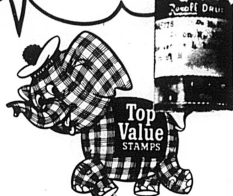
