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## CITY COUNCIL'S SDP ordinance repealed

City Council voted unanimously Monday night to repeal its ordinance "approving and adopting a single document plan, subdivision regulations and zoning ordinance."

Council intends to initiate another ordinance regulating these matters as soon as details can be worked out. In February, the city withdrew from the Carlisle-Nicholas County Planning Commission because the county was not interested in zoning. Then in July, an Independent Planning Commission was created. But, planning board members are needed before this

ordinance can become effective. To date, only one person has agreed to serve on the board.

Veach Berry, outgoing Councilman, asked Mayor Bill Power to let him remain on the Blue Grass Area Development District's Transportation Committee. However, he requested that he be replaced on the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Committee.

In three motions passed unanimously, Berry raised the City Fire Chief's salary from \$200 to \$400 per year retroactive to Jan. 1, 1975. And, he

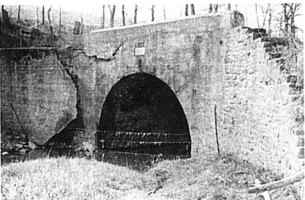
raised firemen's pay from \$5 to \$7 per fire run—not to include fire meetings. Hinkle Contracting, Paris, has submitted a bill for blacktopping of \$2,911.53. Approximately \$5,000 of this amount will be paid from the Operation and Maintenance Account. The rest will come from the state and from revenue sharing funds.

City employee Doug Wills was given permission to attend a water and sewer school Nov. 17-20 in Lexington. His expenses will be paid by the city. His salary was raised earlier in the meeting from \$32 to \$37.20 per month effective Nov. 1. Council felt that his responsibilities merited a salary increase.

In a 4-2 decision, the group voted to remove a meter below Harper's on Main Street and paint curb yellow. Charles Fay and Clarence Cord voted against this motion.

Gayle Vanlandingham was put in charge of filling gas tanks of city vehicles each morning. The vote was 5-0, Berry not voting.

Council then voted unanimously to go into closed session to discuss police department personnel problems.

## Coaches named for NC girl's basketball team

James and Glenn Reynolds were named coaches of the Nicholas County girls' basketball team at the meeting of the Nicholas County Board of Education Saturday.

The Reynolds' will guide the girls' team through a 16-game schedule. The board set Mr. Reynolds' salary for the season at \$200 and Mrs. Reynolds will receive \$200.

The girls and boys basketball schedule was presented to the board at Saturday's meeting. The boys have a tentative schedule of from 26 to 30 games.

The board also approved the construction of a fence between the used car lot owned by Emery Clark and the elementary playground. The board will purchase the necessary materials and Clark will supply the labor.

A new roof will be put on the school's barn as soon as the tobacco crop is removed. Supt. Elder told the board.

The project had been approved by the board in an earlier meeting. It was decided to use shingles over the existing roof.

In other roofing news Supt. Elder asked the board to approve the

repairing of the roof at the high school. The work was done as an emergency measure after the recent heavy rains disclosed numerous leaks in the structure.

The board also approved the signing of contracts for non-resident students from Bourbon, Harrison, Bath, Fleming and the Paris Independent School districts.

The Carlisle Jaycees annual Turkey Party has been changed to Saturday, Nov. 23. Eddie Ellington, chairman, reported.

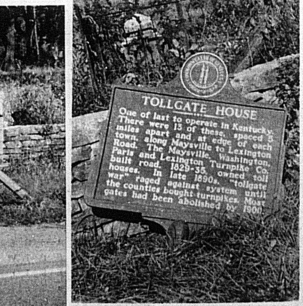
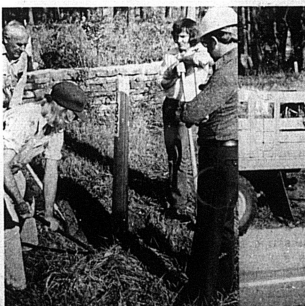
The party will be held in the Carlisle Armory at 7 p.m. as previously stated in The Carlisle Mercury.

One of last to operate in Kentucky. There were 11 in operation in 1900. Now, apart and at some spaced 60 miles apart, they are located in Lexington, Paris and Mt. Vernon. The last toll gate was built in 1822-25, Turppipe Co. was built against the tollgate and the country's first turnpike. More gates had been abolished.



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
