## Democrats to begin nationwide debate on policies

Two thousand grass-roots Democrats and many of the Democratic Party's elected leaders and policy "brain trust" will meet in Louisville, Nov. 13-23 to begin a nationwide debate on the policies of the Democratic Party.

The first National Democratic Issues Convention, sponsored by the Democratic Forum, is being called to examine past party policies and approaches for the future; to begin discussion of the 1976 platform; and to stress the importance of issues in the 1976 presidential campaign.

The convention program, entitled "Beyond the New Deal: Democrats Look to the Future," will emphasize policy discussion in three major areas: The Federal System; How to Make It Work; Economic Growth and Economic

Fairness; and Post-Vietnam Foreign Policy.

Sessions on the Democratic Party's past, present and future will feature historians, public opinion pollsters and futurists.

A major feature of the convention program is a series of debates with the announced Democratic Presidential hopefuls. Senators Henry Jackson, Lloyd Bentsen, Birch Bayh, Congressman Morris Udall, former Senator Fred Harris and Eugene McCarthy, Governor Milton Shapp, former

Governors Jimmy Carter and Terry Sanford, and ex-Ambassador R. Sargent Shriver will participate in the three-day event.

In a joint statement announcing the convention, its co-chairpersons—Rep. Barbara Jordan (Tex.), Sen. Philip Hart (Mich.) and United Auto Workers President Leonard Woodcock—said: "This convention will give Democrats at every level and of every persuasion a chance to offer their ideas... toward building a 1976 party platform based on justice and common sense."

Mayor Harvey Sloane of Louisville and Governor Julian Carroll of Kentucky will act as hosts for the convention.

### 1976 feed grain allotments told

A 1976 national feed grain allotment of 89 million acres was recently announced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

The national allotment represents the quantity of corn, sorghum and barley USDA estimates the U.S. will use domestically and for export during the 1975-1977 marketing year.

The national allotment does not represent a limit on the amount of feed grains that may be planted. It is used solely as a basis for making payments to producers should the market price fall below the established target price or if growers qualify for disaster payments. For 1975 the allotment was also 89 million acres. However, in response to signals from the marketplace rather than the allotment, planted about 100 million acres of corn, sorghum and barley to meet domestic needs and strong and expanding export demand. The department believes producers in 1976 will again study prices and demand, particularly the favorable export outlook, in planning their farming operations.

On Aug. 21, Secretary of Agriculture Earl B. Butz announced there would be no set-aside requirement for the 1976 feed grain, wheat and upland cotton programs. Additional program details will be announced later.
