Mrs. J.S. Pittman will serve as the organist for the Annual Community Thanksgiving Service which will be held at the Carlisle Presbyterian Church Wednesday, Nov. 26. The theme for this service will reflect on the bicentennial emphasis being carried out this year.

Rev. Ben Pumphrey, newly elected president of Nicholas County Ministerial Association, will preside at the meeting. He will call the group to worship at 7:30 p.m. Other program personalities will be the ministers of the local churches.

An octet composed of Mrs. Brenda Lawrence, Mrs. Ann Harper, Mrs. Lee Peters, Mrs. Edith Baker, Harvey Gausse, Roger Wemack, M.C. Blair and Henry Peters will sing "The Thanksgiving Hymn". Mrs. Charlotte Hardin will be the soloist and will sing "Bless This House".

Rev. H. Dallas Sugg of First Baptist Church of Carlisle will be the speaker. He has chosen as his topic "Least We Forget".

Again this year the offering will be brought to the altar by the congregation. Food offerings in metal containers will be appreciated. Because of limitations placed on the giving out of home-canned foods, it is requested that no home-canned foods be contributed. Those preferring to do so may give money. However, after the last year's experience of the need of ready food gifts from the food bank, the association would appreciate food gifts.

From the offering at Thanksgiving time last year, 13 families in Nicholas county have been helped with at least \$150 food gifts. With the money that was made available last year, perishable items have been purchased for needy families.

The Ministerial Association has become the funding agent for the local division of CALP. In this matter the association supplies the money for emergency food stamps. Upon receipt of the expenditure the Community Action group reimburses the association. In this manner the money received for food is used again and again.

Platt attends co-op membership meeting

James Platt of Carlisle represented Southern States Cooperative's members at the association's 52nd annual stockholders meeting held in Richmond, Va. last week. Also attending were Ms. Louise Roundtree and William Netherland representing S.S. Carlisle Cooperative retail outlet.

They heard executive vice president and general manager, John J. Peland, report to the 1400 delegates, guests and employees who attended the session that total dollar volume for the fiscal year ended last June 30 reached \$228 million. This was an increase of about \$43 million.

After Tax Savings Up
Peland also reported at the business session at the Mosque auditorium that after tax net savings from operations reached \$14.9 million, an increase of \$1.2 million. Southern States' total reportable net savings was \$23 million, including an equity of \$8.1 million in the undistributed earnings of the Farmers Chemical Company, Pyre, Tenn., and Texas City Refining, Inc., Texas City, Tex. (Southern States is a part owner of each of these associations.)

Peland shared the reporting at the session with P.M. Armbricht, vice president and controller; J.H. Buchholz, group vice president-wholesale services; and P.E. Mullinix, group vice president-retail services.

The Nicholas County Historical Society, Inc. will enter a horse-drawn buggy.

The Carlisle Girl Scouts and the Nichettes will march.

Eugene Neal, Merl Evans and Emory Clark will drive their antique cars in the parade.

Any person who would like to enter a horse-drawn buggy, antique car or ride a horse in the parade is asked to contact Tom Metcalfe or Billy Clark, co-chairmen of the event.

The annual parade is sponsored by the Carlisle Jaycees and the Carlisle-Nicholas County Chamber of Commerce.

Additional entries of bands, floats or single units are being sought by the parade committee, according to Metcalfe.
