Hogs and pigs number 22 percent below last year

All hogs and pigs on Kentucky farms totaled 900,000 as of Sept. 1, 1975. This was 22 percent below the 1,150,000 head on Sept. 1, 1974 and 3 percent below the 925,000 head on June 1, 1975. Of the 900,000 head, 18 percent or 164,000 head were breeding hogs while 84 percent or 756,000 were kept for market. The number of breeding hogs and market hogs were both down 22 percent from last year. Market hogs were down sharply in all weight groups.

"Therapeutic Consideration of Congestive Heart Failure—Management of the Chronic Coronary Patient" will be the topic of a three-hour continuing education seminar for pharmacists on Tuesday, Oct. 7.

Sponsored by the University of Kentucky College of Pharmacy and the Bluegrass Pharmaceutical Association, the course will begin at 8 p.m. in Room 104 of the College of Pharmacy Building in Lexington.

Forestry conference slated this month

FRANKFORT—A conference in Lexington this month will take up ways to improve Kentucky's forests, which comprise more than 46 per cent of the state's land.

Gov. Julian Carroll called the sixth Governor's Conference on Forestry Oct. 23-24 to see about developing Kentucky's timberlands so they will produce more growing stock and hardwood harvests. Gov. Carroll will open the meeting.

Harry Nadler, director of the forestry division in the Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection, said the conference will feature the forestry incentives program and the tree-planting program and assistance available gives the wood industry to find and develop markets. Several thousand persons make their living directly or indirectly from Kentucky timberland, Nadler said.

Conference topics include the present state of Kentucky's forests, anticipated needs for forest products, finance and federal cost-sharing programs, tree improvement, urban forestry and forest pest management.
