Kentucky reflections

Who or, if anyone's, is to be blamed for the adoption of the proposed judicial amendments to the Kentucky Constitution? City and county officials are ever wary lest such a change threaten their incumbency.

As suggested in a previous article, the adoption of the proposed judicial amendments may have significant financial impact on cities and counties. Under our present constitution cities have their police courts and counties have their quarterly, magistrate and probate courts, and these courts produce income. For example, often the principal percentage of the city attorney or the county attorney fee is derived from a percentage of the fines collected and the balance may go into the unit's general treasury. A county judge's salary may be significantly supplemented by his fees derived from services in his probate court. In cities with less than 25,000 population, the city attorney may receive up to 30% of the fines in criminal proceedings. The county attorney may receive up to 40%.

If police courts, magistrate courts and quarterly courts are redefined every county by a single new district, from what revenues will the city attorney and the county attorney be paid? These officers perform many services which are essential but which generate no revenue for these local units of government. The probate fees earned by the county judge supplement the salary paid to him for his services as chief administrative officer of the county.

Understandably, the county and city officials have real concerns that they may lose revenues which may be difficult to replace under our constitution with its detailed and restrictive limits on taxation.

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Contracted work in Kentucky hit all-time high in July

Gov. Carroll said

FRANKFORT—More than \$31 million in contracted work, an all-time high, was performed during the month of July, according to a report made recently by Gov. Julian Carroll by state Secretary of Transportation John C. Roberts.

The total amount of \$31,333,933.06 exceeded the previous high of \$25.5 million in October, 1974.

"This increased activity is a reflection of our insistence on doing as much as we possibly can to keep Kentucky's working and to see to it that more Kentuckians get work during this period of high unemployment."

"This figure is the amount of work performed by contractors, not the amount of bids let," Roberts emphasized.

"The additional \$6 million over the previous high figure is a result of industrial haul road activities," Roberts added, "combined with the efforts of the Department of Transportation toward progress in some of the more difficult areas."

The pay estimator data contractors for work completed during July in District 9 (Flemingsburg) is \$1,999,800.26.
