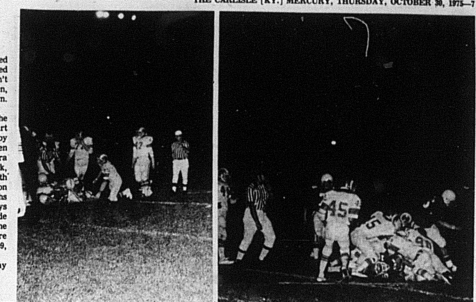

Kentucky Water Sports By Donovan Smith

DON'T FISH WHERE THEY "AINT". FISH A PATTERN. There is an old saying among fishermen that, "You can't catch fish where they ain't." That's why finding a fishing "pattern" is so important if you want to become a successful fisherman. I know that many of my readers are top notch fishermen. They understand structure, fish movements and know how to locate and catch fish. This article is aimed more at the new anglers that love fishing but would like to be more productive. Patterns is the word used to describe what a certain number of fish are caught at a certain time on a given body of water and what methods will catch them. Let me use an example. You're fishing your favorite lake. You've cast the lunka for several hours without any results. You have tried several different kinds of baits and lures. You've all looked good, you're blanked. If you are a reasonably good angler and you have presented your lures or baits properly, it is safe to assume that the fish are just not on the banks, at least not now. Forgetting the banks, you move into a deep cove that is fed by a small stream. In the very back of the cove you catch a fish. A few casts later you pick up another. You have discovered a possible pattern. Using the same lure with the same retrieve at the same depth as the last cove, you catch another fish—again at the back of the cove. You now have a definite pattern, one that will probably work at all of the similar coves that you can find on the lake. Rather than waste time on a hit or miss basis on other waters, you stick to your pattern until it fails. There are probably other patterns you could find. Usually there are several on any body of water, but why quit what is working. Let me use a recent trip to Dale Hollow Lake as a personal example. Dale Hollow has crystal clear water that is tough to fish. However, it is loaded with fish—big fish. In fact the world's record smallmouth bass, an 11 pound 15 ounce monster, was caught there by a Kentuckian, David Hayes of Lexington. It is a lake of contrasts. It has deep points, shallow points, stump rows, weed beds, gravel bars, drop offs, coves, creeks, islands and just about any other kind of fishing area that you could ask for. My companions, Bill Logsdon, Glen Eaves and Mel Atcher of Radcliff and Dexter Pepper and Bill Cefler of Elizabethtown, and I tried everything. We fished all of the areas I have described. We fished with plastic worms, sliders, jigs, spinner baits, crank baits, live minnows, night-crawlers and crickets. With all of this experimenting, we found two patterns. We could catch fish with small live crawfish on deep rocky points that had underwater ledges. The crawfish had to be fished extra slow and right on the bottom with four pound test line. The other pattern was using very small crank baits and trimmed down sliders over the shallow weed beds and gravel bars, again with four pound test line. Even six pound test line seemed to spook the fish and when using it our catch dropped. There had to be other patterns, but we couldn't find any. So, since we had two patterns that would work, we stuck with them. It was tough. No one caught a limit and no fish weighed over three pounds. Still, we did manage to catch several scrappy smallmouth along with some Kentucky and largemouth bass plus a couple of walleye—sticking to our pattern. The next time you fish be observant. Try to find a pattern, then stick to it until it fails to produce fish.
