The following three recipes are from Mrs. Jean Hamlin and are very timely. You may not have any green tomatoes left but if you were lucky enough to escape the frost perhaps you could find just one gallon. I have a few but they were protected by the flowers and weeds.

CUSHAU PIE
 1 cup cooked cusshaw
 1/2 cup sugar
 2 cups half and half
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 2 eggs

GREEN TOMATO CATSUP
 1 gallon green tomatoes
 1 gallon cabbage
 2 tablespoons mustard seed
 1 tablespoon cloves
 1 tablespoon cinnamon
 1/2 gallon vinegar
 1 tablespoon ginger
 1 tablespoon turmeric, if desired
 salt to taste

PUMPKIN PIE
 2 cups pumpkin, cooked
 2 tablespoons butter
 2 eggs
 1 cup sugar
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
 1/2 teaspoon ginger
 pinch of salt

in pie shell and sprinkle cinnamon and nutmeg on top. Bake at 350 degrees until brown on top.

Now after the first real hard frost and the persimmons are not and you are sure they are ripe you might like to try the following recipe from a friend in Louisville.

PERSIMMON BREAD
 2 cups flour
 3 teaspoons baking powder
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
 1 cup persimmon pulp
 2 eggs beaten
 1 cup sugar
 1/2 cup cooking oil
 1/2 cup chopped nuts
 1 cup raisins

Sift flour, baking powder, salt and soda. Thoroughly beat together the pulp, sugar and eggs. Mix in all ingredients. Add oil and nuts well. Fold in raisins and flour into a greased hot pan and bake in a preheated 350-degree oven for 45 to 50 minutes.
