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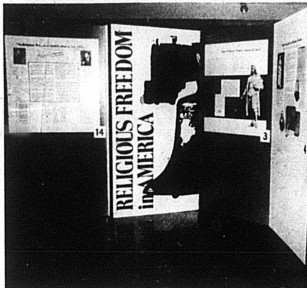

Two tractors plow into each other in Bourbon

Allen Burke, 15, Headquarters Road, Carlisle, suffered minor injuries, Tuesday, Sept. 16, when two tractors, each pulling a pair of wagons in tandem, collided on the Blacks Crossroads, 1/4 mile from the old Millersburg Road in Bourbon county.

Bourbon Sheriff Larry Harney reported that at 5:20 p.m. a tractor, owned and operated by Hobart L. Clemens, 26, of 409 Massie Avenue, Paris, was traveling east. Upon seeing an oncoming tractor gaining speed as it moved down a hill with two wagons it was pulling weaving behind, Clemens pulled his rig as far to the right as possible on the road that was narrow at that point.

Burke, son of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Burke, and driver of the oncoming tractor, which is owned by Badger

Hovernale, Paris, Route 3, applied his brakes, causing the tractor to slip sideways, the left rear of the tractor striking the left front corner of the rear wagon being pulled by Clemens' tractor, according to the sheriff.

On impact, Burke was thrown from his tractor, which continued on going through a fence on the left side of the road, through a field for about 400 yards, then going through another fence and coming to stop against an embankment.

Burke suffered lacerations on his right elbow and was taken to Bourbon County Hospital by Hovernale, being released after treatment.

The Hovernale tractor was reported as heavily damaged. The flat on the Clemens wagon was torn off the wagon frame.

beginning serving at 10 a.m. Also on that date the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources is holding open house at the Minor E. Clark Fish Hatchery near Morehead.

Nationally, officials hope to surpass the 20 million people who participated in National Hunting and Fishing Day programs last year. In Kentucky, sportsmen's clubs will also host activities.

According to hatchery Superintendent Dan Brewer, hatchery personnel will be on hand from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday to answer questions about the hatchery's operations. Material on the Department of Fish and Wildlife and hunting and fishing will be available.

The hatchery, on 300 acres of property, is one of the largest warmwater hatcheries in the country with 122 acres of warmwater ponds. Facilities include a display pool for various species of fish, 24 ten-acre nursery ponds, 82 one-acre production ponds, and four large brood ponds. Bass, musky, walleye, and rockfish are reared there.

The hatchery is located on Camp Run Lake, 15 miles west of Morehead on Ky. 60.
