The participants who are selected the top 4-H boy and girl in each of the three competition age groups in each county. The age groups are 9-12, 13-15, and 16-19 for both boys and girls.

All 10 winners, their parents and county 4-H agents will receive all-expense-paid trips to Louisville to be guests of honor at the annual Farm Awards Luncheon in March, 1976.

In addition to the 10 top awards, plaques will be awarded to the boy and girl selected as the most outstanding 4-H'ers in each extension area in Kentucky. Plaques will also be awarded to the top boy and girl in each county.

Certificates of merit will be awarded to the top boy and girl in each of the three competition age groups in each county. The age groups are 9-12, 13-15, and 16-19 for both boys and girls.

Participants in the program will be judged on their individual academic development, moral development, civic and community development, physical development, and 4-H activities. Judging will take place on three levels: county, extension area, and state.

Participants are judged only within their own age group. Selection of the outstanding 4-H girl and boy in each county must be completed by Nov. 1. The recommended closing date for county competition is Oct. 15.

Previous state runners-up may participate in the program one more time during their 4-H careers. Previous winners of the two top awards are ineligible for further participation.

The scholarship, which pays dormitory room rent, is based upon a student's academic standing in his or her high school graduation class.

The car was found following the robbery in a cemetery a short distance from the bank.

Four-day hunter schools announced

FRANKFORT, Sept. 15—Four day-long Hunter Education Schools are being sponsored by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

The schools, to be held by the department's Division of Conservation Education, are to prepare hunters for the written exam and shooting exercise required for a Safe Hunter Certificate.

Following instruction, the certification test will be given to participants of the schools. As many as 30 states require the Safe Hunter Certificate before issuing a hunting license to an individual.

The schools will be held three consecutive weekends beginning Sept. 27 (National Hunting and Fishing Day). Instruction will be given at Camp Earl Wallace, near Monticello, and Camp Robert Webb, near Grayson, on Sept. 27. A school is scheduled for Camp John Currie, near Benton, Oct. 4. The final school is at Knob Creek Range, near West Point, Oct. 11.

Registration begins at each school at 9 a.m., with instruction following at 9:30 a.m. While the schools are free of charge, there will be a nominal charge for lunch.

Those interested in attending a school should write or call the Division of Conservation Education, Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife, Frankfort, Ky. 40601. An application will be forwarded to them.

State to purchase only domestic dairy products

Gov. Julian Carroll has signed an executive order directing all state purchase orders processed with the Department of Finance and Administration to specify domestic dairy products and to see that all state agencies comply.

The announcement was made Friday by William L. Short, secretary of the Development Cabinet, who delivered a speech for Carroll at an All Kentucky Products Breakfast at the Executive Inn in Louisville.

The governor was there to shake hands with the guests but under his doctor's orders, did not speak. It was his first appearance outside the Governor's Mansion, where he has been recuperating from minor surgery since last week.

The executive order was described by Short as a companion order to a directive issued May 9 by Carroll which requires all state agencies to purchase domestic beef to lessen economic difficulties experienced by Kentucky and American beef cattle farmers.

Short said, "These actions will improve the net income for each farmer involved in these programs and will also guarantee a fairer return on their individual investment and efforts."

He also said that a prime goal of the Carroll administration is to bring a larger share of the domestic and foreign markets for Kentucky farmers

and agricultural processors. Short cited a buyers guide prepared by the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture and plans for construction of a new livestock exposition arena at the Kentucky Fair and Exposition Center as steps already taken to meet this goal.

If there was sufficient interest among processors, Short continued, the possibility of the state establishing a trade referral office on a matching funds proposition would be examined.

This would further expand trade opportunities for Kentucky farmers and farms.

W.C.T.U. reorganized at meeting Monday

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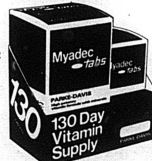
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
