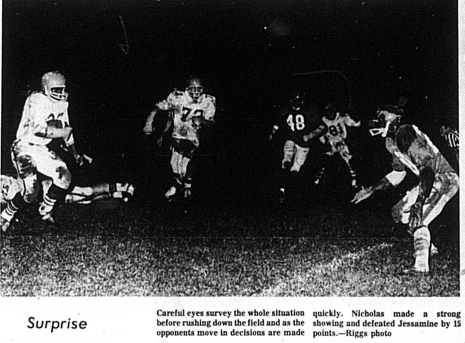


Friday night's game in which Nicholas upset Jessamine 21-6 proved to be filled with surprises, not only for the fans but the players as well.—Riggs photo
