## Nicholas teachers start at \$6,955

The starting salary this school year for a Nicholas County teacher with a bachelor's degree and no experience is \$6,955. The maximum for a local teacher with a bachelor's degree is \$9,900. This compares to teacher's salaries throughout Kentucky ranging from \$4,760 to \$13,437.

Teachers with master's degrees earn between \$7,545 and \$9,925 in the local school system. Those who have a master's degree plus 30 hours earn between \$8,135 and \$10,265.
