Two students to attend fair

Shelley Gabriel and Lynn Judge, Nicholas County Elementary School students, along with nearly 400 contestants are expected to enter the 13th annual Northwest Kentucky Regional Science Fair Saturday, April 10, at Morehead State University. Elementary, junior high and senior high school projects will be open to the public from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. at the Laughlin Health Building. The first place winner and his teacher receive an expense-paid one-week trip to the International Science and Engineering Fair in May in Denver. MSU awards two academic scholarships to high school seniors with outstanding exhibits. All results will be announced at 4 p.m. in Wetherby Gymnasium. Other major prizes include the Eastman Kodak Award for the project making the most effective use of photography and certificates and awards from the U.S. Air Force, Army and NASA. Prizes are awarded for the best projects in biology, mathematics, chemistry and geosciences. Other awards go to the outstanding student projects on elementary, junior high and high school levels and to teachers on each level. The fair is supported through contributions by regional industries and MSU. Dr. W.R. Falls and Dr. Maurice Esham of MSU's Department of Science Education are co-directors of the fair.

Handicapped to attend Easter Seal Camp

Local residents interested in sending handicapped youngsters to an Easter Seal camp this spring or summer may receive information and assistance from Joe Crouch, of Carlisle, the Easter Seal camp chairman for Nicholas county.

Camping sessions at the two Easter Seal resident camps in Kentucky will serve more than 800 boys and girls and young adults this spring and summer. According to Bert Combs, Louisville, state Easter Seal campaign chairman, camping sessions will begin May 24 at Camp Kynoe at Carrollton. Camp Green Shores at Rough River Lake will open June 7 and conduct camping sessions through Aug. 7, he continued.

The Kentucky Easter Seal Society, in the operation of these two outstanding facilities, provides camping opportunities for young Kentuckians with many types of disabilities, he reported. "Camping gives handicapped children an opportunity to gain firsthand knowledge of nature and living, learning and playing with other children," Combs said.

First payment due for tax estimators

LOUISVILLE—Many Kentucky citizens who do not have enough taxes withheld are required to pay their first installment of estimated 1978 Federal income taxes no later than Thursday, April 15.

The total estimated tax due may be paid in four equal installments: April 15, June 15, Sept. 15, and Jan. 17. "Many taxpayers realize that they must meet the requirements for filing a tax declaration at this time of year," said Paul Niederrecker, IRS District Director for Kentucky. "Generally, when the taxpayers will owe IRS more than \$100 not covered by withholding, they should file a declaration of estimated tax. A Form 1040-ES voucher must accompany the first installment. Taxpayers who file a declaration of estimated tax last year should have received an estimated package in the mail, which includes four declaration vouchers and preaddressed envelopes for making the 1978 declaration and payments. Also included in the package are a worksheet and instructions. Taxpayers who are required to file, and did not receive an estimated tax package in the mail, can obtain it at IRS offices.

NO SUCH THING AS SURPLUS JEEPS

Serviceable, surplus jeeps are not available at the Lexington-Blue Grass Army Depot, a depot spokesman announced today.

The spokesman further commented that during the past 15 years the Department of Defense has had no serviceable jeeps available for sale to the public. He said the only jeeps available during that time had been cannibalized vehicles—those with parts missing and fitted with old or worn parts from other vehicles. The depot has recently received several phone calls about the availability of surplus jeeps. Apparently these calls have been triggered by solicitations offering new, unassembled jeeps for sale at \$125. The depot spokesman warned anyone interested in these solicitations to investigate fully before investing money.

The depot does not have surplus jeeps for sale at any price, he concluded.
