An eighth grade student at Nicholas County Elementary School, young Burton was admitted to the Central Baptist Hospital in Lexington where 30 doctors from Central Baptist Hospital and the University of Kentucky Medical Center worked around the clock trying to discover what was wrong with him. The doctors had no hope of his recovering until last Thursday when the UK doctors diagnosed his illness as hepatitis, histoplasmosis and pneu-

The Nicholas County Ministerial Association has planned two community worship services for Holy Week this year. The services will be on Good Friday and Easter Sunday morning. The Good Friday Service, which will be held at the First Baptist Church, will be at 7 p.m. on April 16. The service will be not more than one hour in length. The Ministerial Association is asking the merchants and businessmen to close their businesses for this hour on Good Friday. The Good Friday Service will be a service of meditation and prayer.

There will be a time for personal meditation on the cross, our sins, and a time for confession of our sins. Each of the ministers in town will participate in the service. The service will emphasize the necessity of Christ's death for our deliverance from our sins. The music and scriptures will reflect upon the cross of Christ as the fulfillment of the Suffering Servant passages of the Old Testament. The Easter Sunday Service will be held at the Moorefield Methodist Church at 8:30 a.m. on April 18. This service will be a service of jubilation in

which all of the community will sing the praises of God for the deliverance from the tomb of His Son, our Savior. As the early morning of many hundreds of years ago revealed a new beginning for the disciples and other followers, so this Sunday morning in the early hours Nicholas countians will meet to have a new beginning of their experience with God. The service will emphasize the significance of the resurrection and will be highlighted by a message delivered by Rev. Howard Livingston.

There will be an offering taken at the Easter Sunday Service, but there will not be an offering received at the Good Friday Service. The host church will serve coffee and donuts after the service. Individual church services this Holy Week, in addition to what the community services are:

The play is directed by Miss Kay Pruitt assisted by Cheryl Lowe and Carol Chamberlin. The public is invited according to the pastor, Rev. Richard Chamberlin.

Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe will participate in the Mass of The Last Supper at 7:30 p.m. Holy Thursday. Participation of the Blessed Sacrament will be held after Mass until 11 p.m. Good Friday Services will be held at 12 noon with the Way of the Cross, and at 7:30 p.m. the Liturgy of Christ's Passion and Death.

On Holy Saturday, the Mass of the Easter Vigil will be held at 8 p.m. Easter Sunday Mass will be celebrated at 10 a.m. After Mass, the youth group will conduct an Easter Egg Hunt for the children. Invitational track meet at Nicholas County High

Nicholas County High School will hold its NCCO Relays for boys on Thursday, April 15. This is the first invitational track meet to be held at the high school. USDA announces wool payments

Incentive payment rate of 61.1 percent of 1975 marketings of shorn wool has been announced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). The announced payment rate is based on the difference between the national average price of 44.7 cents a pound received by producers during 1975 and the previously announced incentive price of 72 cents a pound. Incentive payments to wool growers are required under the National Wool Act of 1954, as amended. The 1975 payment rate compares with the 1974 rate of 21.8 percent. Payments of \$40 million compared to payments of \$15 million on 1974 marketings. Grower's payments on 1975 marketings is determined by multiplying the net dollar return from the sale of wool by the payment rate of 61.1 percent. This percentage method of payment is designed to encourage growers to improve the quality and marketing of their wool. In any marketing year for which incentive payments are made, the higher the price a grower receives for his wool, the larger his payment. A payment rate of 11.00 per cent.
