Presley Kendall wins gold and bronze medals in Mexico City

Major Presley Kendall began a 1976 shooting season by winning a bronze and gold medal at the just completed Benito Juarez International matches in Mexico City.

The matches, attended by 13 countries from the Americas and Europe were a test of national prestige in an Olympic year. Shooting a German and a Soviet target rifle, Kendall won a silver barrel, Kendall posted a score of 396.200.

The bull's size of a dime and 14 meters was hit 24 out of 50 times by Kendall. Before going to Mexico Kendall fired in and won the Tennessee State Rifle Championship in Nashville.

Kendall won by posting a 797.200. In two of the spring matches Kendall won the metallic sight aggregate and International Olympic course of fire match in Miami two weeks ago. Following the Miami matches, Kendall

was an instructor and fired on the National Guard's select U.S. team while participating in southwestern high power competition in Phoenix, Ariz., shooting an Army M-14 service rifle.

The National Guard team with Mayor Kendall as a member dominated team and individual competitions.
