

# Roundup high school sports and field trips

**Baseball**  
Ricky Hicks pitched and won three of the four baseball games won by Nicholas County High School this season. They were against Woodford County 7-1, Bath County 4-2, and Mason County 6-2.

He has given up only one earned run in three ball games.

Games lost have been Woodford County 4-2, Harrison County 14-2 and Mason County 5-4.

The team faces Mt. Sterling in a double-header here at 12 noon on Thursday, April 15, and Mason County in a double-header at home on Saturday at 11 a.m.

**Track**  
The boys track team was defeated at Madison Central in Richmond on Monday evening. The two relays were run by the local boys better than ever before. Coach Ben Pumphrey said. The 800 was run in 1 minute, 49 seconds, and the mile was run in 3 minutes, 55 seconds.

The local boys team defeated Augusta and Fleming County by 15 points last Tuesday. Fleming County won the girls' match.

Trippy Clark, son of Emory Clark Jr. of Fleming County had an outstanding day, according to Coach Ben Pumphrey.

He competed in all six events and scored as follows: pole vaulted 12 feet; high jumped 5 feet, 8 inches; long jumped 20 feet, 11 inches; triple jumped 41 feet, 7 inches; ran high hurdles in 16.2 seconds; ran low hurdles in 21.7 seconds.

Both teams lost to Clark County last Thursday. The boys team was second, defeating Fendley County.

**Golf**  
The Nicholas County High School golf team was defeated in its two matches last week by Paris and Bourbon County on Tuesday and Harrison County on Friday.

All Harrison County, the golfers lost to the number one team in the region—Harrison, Lexington Catholic, fortified the match in Cynthiana giving the local golfers the number two spot. First team players are John Peters, Tim Dudley, Mike Conley and Sam Dudley.

The tennis team, comprised of about seven girls and seven boys has been practicing three days a week at the Recreation Park.

The first match will be the Eastern Invitational Tournament at Richmond on April 24. Bill Gutrie and David Hughes are coaches.

centennial movie in Lexington before returning to school. Denny Tackett and Bill Gutrie accompanied the students.

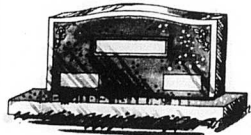

## Broun to speak at Kentucky Group forum

Waymond Hale Broun, nationally known sports commentator, will address the Kentucky Group Banks' Forum luncheon April 15 at the Lexington Hilton Inn.

Broun has been noted for his coverage of the unusual, the sometimes forgotten and the little publicized events in the world of sports. He says: "Sports are sports. People sometimes think it is silly that a youngster's marble tournament will be given news coverage on the same basis as the Super Bowl might. But consider the pressure on a 11-year-old marble player in world championship competition. The shot he makes with that wet, slippery round piece of glass, over some damn clay, may determine whether or not he will win a \$5,000 scholarship. I think that pressure on a 11-year-old is as great as the pressure a mature professional athlete endures."

Broun, a Swarthmore graduate—where he was number six on the table tennis team—claims that sports do not build character. "Sports reveal character," he says, "and I enjoy writing of sports because, I think,

success competitively—is essential to greatness. I write of people who are interesting and not necessarily those whom I like personally."

Broun, whose favorite sport is horse racing, never excelled athletically as a youngster. At 135 pounds, his biggest

success competitively was winning \$112 on a Kentucky Derby wager.

The owner of a castle in southern Ireland which he plans to convert to a hotel, Broun is busy traveling the United States covering sports spectacles, running two recording companies, doing CBS news and sports

FRANKFORT—Two bills concerning the health of school children were passed by the 1978 General Assembly. Children are now required to be immunized against rubella, commonly called German Measles, and tested for tuberculosis in order to enroll in school. The tuberculosis testing requirement, effective the start of the 1976-77 school year, will be effective for a two-year period. After that, schools with a proven infection rate below 0.3 per cent will be exempt.
