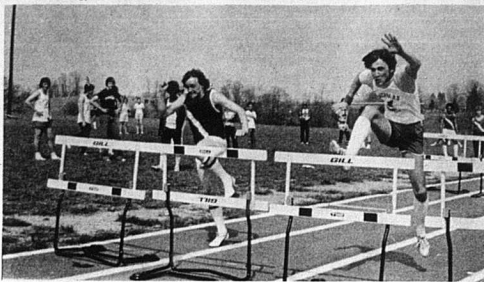


Bluejackets capture second-place in first invitational track tourney



The Bluejackets captured second-place honors with a score of 68 in competition with five other track teams in its first NCOO Relays held at Nicholas County High School last Thursday. Pulaski County scored 84 for first-place awards. Pulaski dominated the tournament with nine wins out of the 17 field and running events.

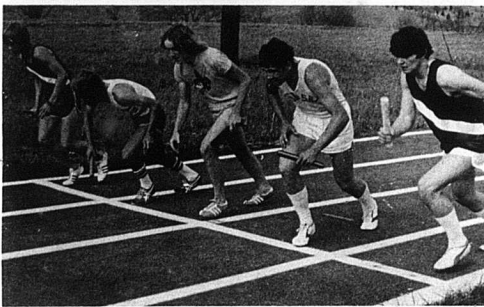
The Jackets won the Triple Jump with a winning performance of 112 feet 5/8 inches. The winning team members are Clifford Thompson who jumped 41 feet 10 inches, and Joe Ruddle and Gary Williams. Pulaski County won four of the other five field events, and Madison Central won the High Jump. Nicholas County was second in four of the six field events.

Coach Ben Pumpfrey said Monday that 28 track team members will travel to the Male Invitational Tournament Saturday in Louisville. All three teams will compete. Coach Pumpfrey also said that the Junior High team will compete with the four best teams in Louisville, although these teams have not been named as yet.

The four-member Bluejacket team competing in the 11 running events performed very well for a young team, according to Coach Ben Pumpfrey. The Junior High team won two events, the 400 Relay and the Mile Relay. Members of the winning 400 Relay team are Mike Berry, Randy Hunter, Tim Ockerman, and Greg Willis. The winning Mile Relay team consisted of Greg Willis, Ron Roser, Mark Ruddle and Roy Hunt. Owen County won three of the running events, but did not win any field events. Madison Central won the remaining running events, the Junior High 800 Relay.

New school records were set by

Clifford Thompson, Triple Jump; Gary White, 10 ft. Pole Vault; and Pendleton County, 14. The Girl's Track team was third April 13 in competition with Menifee County—the winner of the region last year—and Augusta.

Homemakers attend Needlecraft Workshop

The Cooperative Extension Needlecraft Workshop, under the direction of Mrs. Marjorie Wilson, was concluded last week. 28 county Homemakers were enrolled. The average attendance was 14. The value of the articles completed was \$172.

Projects included the making of Broomstick shawl, macrame plant hangers, embroidered shirts, acrylic painted skirt and shirt, decorated shirt (with quilted design), quilted pillows, button necklaces, tablecloth, needlepoint rug, crocheted pillow, Afghan, two knitted afghans, and a child's crocheted dress, knitted sweaters and afghans, crocheted baby shawl (stitch), crocheted Granny square, two knitted afghans, and a cross stitch quilt.

Baptists celebrate 200 years of preaching in Kentucky

Seven local persons attended the special day of celebration held at Harrodsburg on Monday in observance of 200 years of Baptist preaching in the state of Kentucky. Members of the First Baptist Church of Carlsle who attended are: Mr. and Mrs. Thomas C. Johnson, Mrs. Robert Coatsley, Miss Ernestine Eads, Mrs. Powell Neal, Miss Alma Atkinson, and Rev. H. Dallas Sugg.

"I was on April 19, 1778, at Fort Harro in Harrodsburg (now Harrodsburg) that Thomas Tinsley and William Hickman preached the first sermons on record by Baptists in our Commonwealth territory. Though we know that Squire Boone (Darius's brother) Baptist preacher, preceded these men on Kentucky soil and must have preached, the earliest record we have is of Fort Harro services of Hickman and Tinsley on Franklin Owen.

On April 19, 1978, Baptists (black and white) who now number over 800,000 in Kentucky were represented in Harrodsburg by some 2,000 persons who assembled at 10 a.m. for a day of preaching. The theme was "Proclaiming Liberty in Christ." The host church, the 1,500 seat Harrodsburg Baptist Church, arranged for closed circuit television for the overflow crowd expected.

Mrs. Harold Hamm and Mrs. James Eads attended the 73rd annual meeting of the Kentucky Woman's Missionary Union held at the First Baptist Church, Owensboro, April 29-32. The theme for the meeting was "Where the Spirit of the Lord Is, There is Freedom."

Speakers for the April 19th program included five prominent men: Wayne E. Ward, professor of Christian Theology, Southern Seminary, Louisville; A. Russell Award, pastor of New Zion Baptist Church, Louisville; Verlin C. Knackwitz, pastor, Severna Valley Baptist Church, Elizabethtown; Frank Owen, executive secretary-treasurer, Kentucky Baptist Convention, Middleburg; and Manuel Scott, pastor, Calvary Baptist Church, Los Angeles, Calif.
