'76 burley crop could be repeat

Will the 1978 burley tobacco year prove to be a rerun of 1973?

A near repeat might be expected, according to the planting prospects announced at mid-April by the USDA crop reporting service.

But many other factors are at work—plant weather—to control production and marketing, and to confirm the adage that "no two tobacco crops are ever alike."

Nicholas county growers last year produced and marketed 6,701,828 pounds, which brought \$19,462,112 on the basis of the beltwide average of \$196.80.

Prospective plantings in Kentucky counties are reported by the State ASCS as only 1% below 1975 acreage harvest totals, listing 185,000 acres this year compared with 187,000 last year, and 176,000 for 1974.

Kentucky's indicated 1978 planting coincides with that of the eight-state burley belt as a whole—97% of the 1975 acreage. This State produces 65% of the burley grown in the U.S.

The proposed loan rate announced this month for the 1978 crop provided for \$109.50 average per hundredweight, as compared with last year's support price of \$96.10. Last year's crop sold mostly at \$12 to \$11 above the support price.

Although a 5 per cent marketing quota cut was set for 1976, bringing the crop 40 million below last year's, the effective farm quotas are expected to total about 727 million pounds, due to carryover. Since marketings usually are some 15 per cent under effective farm quotas, this year's burley would be near the 638 million pound 1975 crop.

'Daniel Boone' bicentennial for 11 years

Camp Weasel founder is honored for work

It has been nine years since Dr. Kenneth Gerson packed his station wagon full of children and grooves and headed for the North Central 441 Campground three miles from Carlisle.

So, with the University of Kentucky physician's own time and resources, he began Camp Weasel, the model for a dozen other similar camps, the turning point in a hundred children's lives, and the 44-year-old pediatric allergist and director of the UK Pediatric Allergy Clinic.

Dr. Gerson, a quiet, gentle man, was last summer named Kentucky Physician of the Year by the Kentucky Department of Human Resources through its Kentucky Committee on Employment of the Handicapped.

Specifically, the UK professor was recognized for his "can do" philosophy, particularly where related to children with allergy problems severe enough to restrict their activities.

Camp Weasel, where for nine years youngsters have learned to live comfortably with their illness and to compete in the world, has since its founding inspired a half dozen other camps across the U.S. and in Hawaii.

The first campers, all of them eight to 15-year-olds with asthma and respiratory ailments, named Camp Weasel after the wheezing sound they make.

"I had the help of a lot of different people," Dr. Gerson says. Recent staff at Camp Weasel—all volunteers—has included premedicals and UK students in respiratory therapy, nursing and other help disciplines. The Kentucky Association for Asthmatic Children, Inc. now provides scholarships to the camp for children who could not otherwise afford to go, and Dr. Gerson tirelessly spreads the news of the camp to the state's physician school personnel and health professionals.

His chief research interests are symposium on asthma at Denver for asthma and immune deficiency 100 U.S. physicians with special interest disorders. Last summer he attended a in the condition.

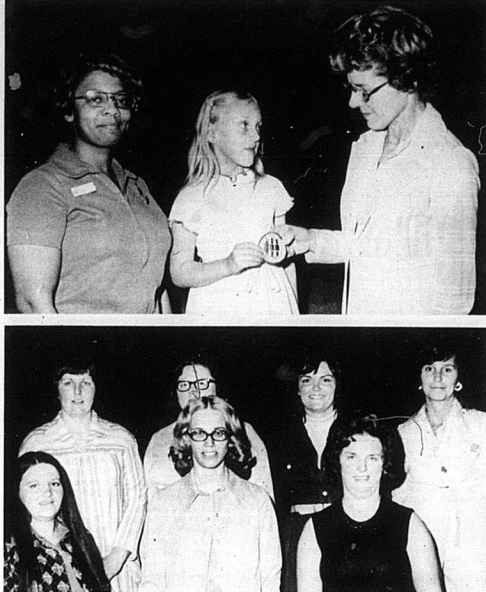
