Sept. 7 beef referendum

Thomas O. Harris, Kentucky Commissioner of Agriculture, has announced that a statewide Bovine Animal Referendum will be conducted Sept. 7. Voting will be in the Cooperative Extension Service offices from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. (local time).

Any person engaged in the production of bovine beef animals on a commercial basis, including the owners of farms on which bovine animals are produced, tenants and sharecroppers sharing in the proceeds of the sale of bovine animals shall be entitled to cast a vote in the referendum provided the producer is 18 years of age or older.

Voting by absentee ballot will be permissible provided the request for an absentee ballot is made in writing to the Commissioner at least 10 days in advance of Sept. 7. The absentee ballot must be signed and returned to the

Commissioner on or before Sept. 7, before it will be counted in the referendum.

Bovine animal producers will vote on whether or not to have 10 cents per head deducted for the purpose of financing a ket development, and education designed to increase the production, use and sale of bovine animals and bovine animal products. This assessment will be deducted by the purchaser and sent to the Kentucky Beef Cattle Association monthly to administer the program.

If the referendum passes, the deductions will begin on Nov. 1. The referendum will be held in all 120 counties in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

City police arrest juvenile

City policemen arrested a juvenile Saturday night after an anonymous phone caller stated that the boy was wanted out-of-state on a felony charge.

Policemen Jim Moore and Leonard Irvin investigated the call, and found a 17-year-old boy in Dorseyville in possession of a stolen auto. He was charged locally with receiving stolen property. It was later found that there is a warrant in Michigan for him for breaking and entering, and another in Ashland for armed robbery.

State Trooper John Hall said Tuesday that the boy was taken to the Juvenile Detention Home in Harrison county to await further legal procedures.
