Pesticide procedure may be dangerous

FRANKFORT—A procedure for pesticide decontamination of water wells using washing soda, household detergent and laundry bleach is ineffective and may be dangerous, according to Dr. Frank Stamos, commissioner of the state environmental protection bureau.

Several state veterinary newsletters have outlined the procedure, which the Federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) says fails to determine what specific pesticide may be in the well water or the circumstances for which the procedure is applicable.

"Before attempting to decontaminate any private water wells, it is necessary to evaluate the water in terms of what specific pesticides are present," Stamos explained.

"You have to know the kind and concentration of chemicals contaminat-

ing the water, but above all, it should be remembered that no universal chemical method for decontamination exists for all pesticides," he added.

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Mrs. Williams named assistant state librarian

FRANKFORT—Barbara Williams of Frankfort recently joined the Kentucky Department of Library and Archives as assistant state librarian. Charles P. Hinds, director of the department, said Mrs. Williams works directly with all the field and in-house library programs.

"She will be coordinating all the programs offered by 116 public county libraries participating in the state library system," said Hinds. This includes KENCLIP—Kentucky Cooperative Library Information Project which provides patron accessibility to all the resources of libraries across the state—the bookmobile program, and technical services which deals with microfilm reader-printers and audiovisual equipment and materials.

"She is also working with the Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped in Frankfort and Louisville, and with libraries in institutions such as prisons and juvenile delinquent centers," added Hinds.

Mrs. Williams is no stranger to the state library—or state government. She was employed with the state library from 1965 to 1968. She then worked with the Kentucky Program Development Office until 1972, where she organized that office's library. From 1972 to 1974, Mrs. Williams worked in the state Finance Department. She is active in the Council of Planning Librarians, a group interested in problems of library organization and research and in
