### Small factory wants Carlisle site

A small factory, employing 50 men and a woman in local manufacturing, Carlisle, announced Monday that it would not add a great burden to the city, but would bring in additional tax money. These include Mockingbird Lane with 34 homes, the right side of East Main including Fryman's Grocery (the left side is in the city), and several

areas on West Main. The total number of homes and businesses recommended for annexation is 46, valued at around \$1,000,000.

City officials are interested in attracting the industry whose owners plan to build a 40,000 sq. ft. building. Therefore, every avenue will be sought to obtain the gas even if bottled gas is necessary. Mayor Bill Power stated that City gas customers will pay an increase of 36 cents across the board effective Nov. 18. Council unanimously passed the raise because of Columbia Gas increases to the city. The new minimum gas charge, for example, rises from \$1.80 to \$2.15 for the first 1,000 cu. ft. Another raise is expected around the first of February.

Another ordinance was passed 6-0 making it unlawful to carry beer in open containers in or about the person within the city. Both ordinances are printed in their entirety on the classified page today.

Oliver V. Berry, chairman of the Carlisle Independent Planning Commission, distributed copies of the new comprehensive Plan, Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision Regulations.

Anyone wishing to refer to regulations may do so at the city office.
