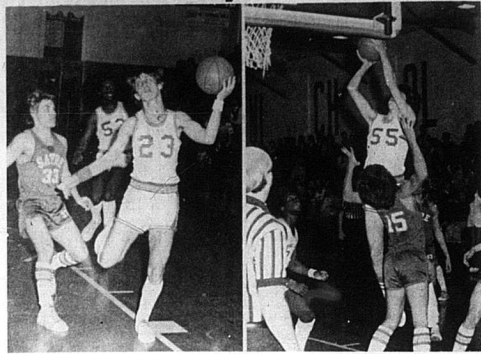


# Jackets demolish Sayre, 76-50

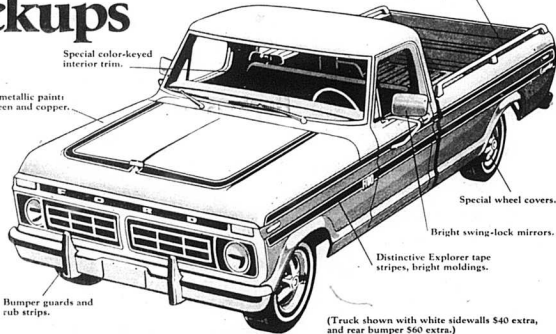
The remainder of the game Sayre could offer no resistance to the powerful Bluejacket game. With Gray and Letcher shining, the Jackets finished the game on top 76-50.

Several members brought quilts that some had made for themselves or their grandchildren. One had been made by one member's grandmother and one by one's great-great grandmother. Books containing quilts and pictures collected through the years were displayed. The three main types of quilts—patchwork, applique, and cross stitched were in our display.

Our early ancestors made quilts for decorative and functional purposes. The life of America is written in her quilts. The patterns reflect the social, political, and religious thinking of its people.

Quilts are becoming very popular. Quilt making is both an art and a skill you can enjoy. They can be used as bedspreads or wall hangings.

There are several types of quilting frames. The 18 inch square frame was used to demonstrate the quilting of a pillow or quilting of large squares of a quilt.

### Kennedy to address Group Bank forum

LEXINGTON—Walter Kennedy, for 12 years Commissioner of the National Basketball Association, will speak to the Kentucky Group Banks' Forum at 12 noon, Thursday, Feb. 12, at the Lexington Hilton Inn.

Now retired, Kennedy's topic will concern a look behind the scenes at sports and his concern for the need for moral leadership. His audience will be composed of bank officers and their invited guests from each of the 19 Kentucky Group member banks.

Commissioner Kennedy was the architect of the NBA's expansion program that saw the Association grow from nine teams when he took office to 18 clubs; he developed its network television program, non-existent in 1963, to the point where a Sunday "Game of the Week" and other prime-time games were carried on a full national network, with rights fees increasing from \$60,000 in 1964 to \$2,000,000 when he retired in 1975. Actual attendance at NBA games grew from 1.9 million in the 1963-64 season to 7,862,596 in his last season. He retired in June of 1975, after 12 years as Commissioner.
