

Your representative in Frankfort

The highlights of the House's activity centered around the vote by the House to rescind the Equal Rights Amendment. While the vote was 23 to 40, it was substantial, there was expressed much concern by both proponents and opponents relative to the legality of rescission since in the past Congress alone has exercised the prerogative of accepting or not accepting a resolution rescinding a prior action.

The vote of rescission by the House clearly expresses to the Congress and to other states considering ratification, the feelings of Kentuckians and cannot help but have a significant impact. A number of measures aimed at the ultimate goal of abolishing forced busing to achieve racial integration were passed by the House by overwhelming votes. Again these measures made clear for Congress the true feelings of Kentuckians as to the conceptualism involved in governmental controls.

One of the most positive measures acted upon by the House this week is HD 770 which will provide free textbooks for our children and is considered a most progressive measure.

The House Appropriations and Revenue Committee continued its review of the Governor's budget with the expectation of finalizing its review within the next week and a half. The true importance of the budget review

and hearings is to inform the citizens of the contents of the budget and supply answers as to why our tax money is being spent in the manner recommended. The budget hearings which are open to the press and public have been conducted in the Senate chambers and have been extremely productive in terms of providing information and insight into the manner of state supported programs and activities.

The coming week will see action upon a number of housekeeping measures as well as some significant legislative proposals. Housekeeping measures are those which are presented to the legislature every two years by various administrative agencies and executive agencies to bring their programs and activities up to the standards of the times since the Kentucky General Assembly can meet only once every two years much of the legislation with which we must concern ourselves comes from agencies who often are causing problems for the people they serve, because the problem cannot be attacked by the legislature except when we are in session.

Among some of the most important matters to be considered on the floor of the House in the coming week will be bill creating a commission to codify the multitude of statutes in Kentucky dealing with our cities. Because of the conflicts and vagueness and lack of proper codification of cities statutes on the law books, many severe problems occur.

Another resolution will ask Congress to develop steps to insure the viability of the beef industry by limiting beef imports.

Kentucky consumers will have an important measure up for House consideration in the Senate chambers. While the intent of this measure is unquestionably good, it is feared that the problem of definitions of unfair will cause many confusions and perhaps cause an undue burden upon the small business man.

In the education area HB 70 will implement a career education in elementary, secondary, and adult education programs. The creation of such a program has long been sought by some in education and will be a matter of some controversy on the House floor.

This change was in the form of a Constitutional Amendment that extends eligibility to persons that own their homes but rent apartments therein.

The Kentucky Department of Revenue has instructed me not to implement the change until they issue specific instructions. However, this office will receive applications as soon as possible, pending receipt of instructions.

1. All owners must be 65 years of age.
2. Owners must live in the dwelling for which the application is made.

FRANKFORT—The fifth in a series of regional public meetings seeking local input for a new Kentucky Aviation Systems Plan (KASP) has been scheduled for March 4 in Lexington.

According to State Transportation Secretary John C. Roberts, the regional meetings are being held to gather information needed to update the state's first "airport systems plan" completed in 1971.

Roberts said he expects the plan to be updated within 18 months. It will be revised every five years in order to keep the state abreast of changing needs and developments.

Counties to be represented at the meeting will include Lincoln, Boyle, Garrard, Madison, Estill, Powell, Clark, Fayette, Jessamine, Mercer, Anderson, Woodford, Bourbon, Scott, Franklin, Harrison, Nicholas, Fleming, Lewis, Mason, Robertson, Bracken, Pendleton, Grant, Owen, Carroll, Gallatin, Boone, Kenton, and Campbell.

The meeting will be held at 1:30 p.m. at the Hospitality Inn located on North Broadway next to the I-75 interchange.
