The following bread recipes are the basic breads used by a typical family. Sometimes it is bread from the grocery store, or a ready mix, or from what you store. However, once in a while nearly every cook will want to try her hand at making a loaf of her choice.

If you really want to try your best foot forward for a company dinner, you can't miss with these rolls.

PETTIE ROLLS
Have 1/2 lb. margarine in large bowl. Scald 1 cup milk and pour over margarine. When lukewarm, add 1 dissolved in 1/4 cup lukewarm water and 1 heaping tablespoon sugar, two eggs beaten with 1/4 cup sugar and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Stir in 4 cups sifted flour, grease top lightly, cover and chill overnight in refrigerator. Dough will seem too soft but don't worry, when it is chilled and you are

ready to make out the rolls, it will be stiff enough.
Rolls may be made any size or shape. I use muffin tins well greased. When ready to make out rolls, pull off enough dough to work into size of an English Walnut. Put two or three in each muffin cup. Deep fingers well greased. It's a bit messy until you get the hang of it, but it is worth it.

Make out as many rolls as you need, let rise 4 or more hours in a warm place. Bake approximately 15 minutes at 350 degrees. Rolls should rise triple or more in size.
For Sweet Rolls use Basic Roll recipe. Knead all of dough lightly and roll out into oblong shape about 1/4 inch or less thick, cover with brown sugar, broken pecans, butter and cinnamon. Roll dough up long way (as for jelly roll) use water on finger tips to seal last turn. Cut in 1 inch slices and place in greased muffin tins to rise in warm place several hours. Bake 40 degrees about 15 or 20 minutes. Remove from pan at once.

BASIC ROLLS
Beat 1 egg, add 1/4 cup sugar, 1/4 cup shortening. Stir until smooth. Add 1 cup hot water. When lukewarm, add 1 yeast cake or 1 package dry yeast, 1/4 teaspoon salt. Add 4 to 5 cups of flour.
