

# Kay's Kitchen

Here we are again wondering what to do with those bits of leftover turkey, ham or what have you. You probably feel you never want another bite of turkey again. Unless there is really enough to justify freezing a good size portion whole, I would suggest making a salad and freezing for use later. Six months from now it would be nice to have a meal practically ready for you by thawing.

Try this if you have only a small portion of meat. Cook 1 cup of macaroni according to package directions. Make 1 cup rich well seasoned cheese sauce. In 2 tablespoons of margarine cook about 1 green pepper and one medium onion until limp. Add 1 can of mushroom pieces and one chicken bouillon cube. Combine 1 cup of more of turkey with drained macaroni and other ingredients except cheese sauce into oblong casserole. Do 45 degrees each until done. Sprinkle with paprika and heat until bubbly in a 300 degree oven.

You may want to try this once while hot. That is, let it cool in cold, then remove with spatula to freezing paper. Wrap securely and label. If you want to freeze all of the turkey, heat it out on freezer paper and cut into amount needed for your family or leave whole.

**HOT TURKEY 'N CHIPS**  
2 cups cooked, cubed turkey (or chicken)  
2 cups finely diced celery  
1 cup chopped almonds  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 teaspoons grated onion  
1/2 cup ketchup  
1 cup mayonnaise  
1/2 cup crushed potato chips  
1 cup mashed potato chips  
Combine all ingredients except cheese and potato chips. Spoon lightly into individual buttered custard cups or one large baker. Sprinkle with cheese and potato chips. Bake in hot oven at 350 degrees until heated through.

Country ham does freeze well. However, it is one piece and slice later when you are ready to use it. When ready to slice either have it done

or do it yourself before the piece of ham is completely thawed.  
Candy, if packaged in an air tight carton, freezes well as do most cakes and cookies. Remember you can freeze anything you like just as long as you are surprised at how good all these things will taste six weeks or more from now.  
If you have cake that is no longer moist, slice and put whipped cream between each slice then ice over all with whipped cream. Refrigerate overnight.

If your old ham is beyond slicing, remove fat and put through food mill into a meat grinder. It is delicious in ham sandwiches, egg omlette, ham roll, in potato cakes, and scrambled eggs.  
You can make delightful appetizers by adding just enough mayonnaise to the ground ham to make into small balls, then roll in finely crushed crackers.

## Two officers discharged

FRANKFORT—Conservation officers Jerry P. Maspin, Murray, and Billie E. Travis, Princeton, have been discharged from their position as fish and wildlife law enforcement officers, effective Jan. 5, state Fish and Wildlife Commissioner Arnold Mitchell said.  
The officers' dismissal resulted, Mitchell said, from their arrests and subsequent convictions for violating state and federal migratory waterfowl hunting laws in the state of South Dakota in late October.  
The disciplinary action was taken, the commissioner added, after a hearing with the two officers and after a thorough review and evaluation of reports from the South Dakota Department of Game, Fish and Parks and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service regarding the incident.  
According to state Personnel rules, Mitchell said, the former officers may appeal their dismissal to the State Personnel Board.

On Jan. 11, at 10 p.m. in the Legislative Research Committee Room on the third floor of the State Capitol Building in Frankfort, there will be a meeting concerning Hemophilia Legislation to be presented to the State Legislature this year.  
All hemophiliacs, families of hemophiliacs, legislators, health personnel and all other interested parties are invited.  
"Hemophilia" is a bleeding disorder resulting from a genetically determined deficiency factor in the blood, which if not replaced can lead to serious bleeding into joints and other tissues in the body.  
The proposed bill if enacted will organize a State-Wide Hemophilia Treatment Program and make the blood factor that prevents bleeding available to hemophiliacs throughout the state.
