



Five beds gained at Nursing Home as bed-change application approved

The state Comprehensive Health Planning Council has approved an application by the Johnson-Mathers Nursing Home to convert 32 skilled nursing beds, 10 personal care beds and eight intermediate care beds to four personal care beds, 20 intermediate care beds and 31 skilled nursing beds. This is an increase of five beds total which will be placed in the rooms formerly occupied by Administrator Douglas Keener.

Ken Urlage, Mathers Home, Inc. Administrator, explained Tuesday that the greater amount of intermediate care beds has been needed for a long time. He said that the Nursing Home has always had trouble filling its personal care beds (those beds occupied by persons able to care for themselves entirely).

The Council approved a new level of care which will immediately benefit 2,029 Kentuckians.

The council recommended that 20 group homes with a maximum of eight persons in each be established during 1976-77 to meet an anticipated immediate need of 254 beds.

Under the group home care system, mentally retarded developmentally disabled persons would receive care from infancy through old age. The homes would be located near social service agencies, public health agencies and recreational facilities. The new system meets the philosophy of the Gov. Carroll and the Department for Human Resources (DHR) of moving these people into a home setting as much as possible.

Final state tax payments due

LOUISVILLE—Many Kentucky citizens who do not have enough taxes withheld are required to pay their final installment of 1975 estimated Federal Income Tax no later than Thursday, Jan. 15 (today). Also due today are amended estimates from citizens whose 1975 income changed substantially during the last quarter.

"Many taxpayers first met the requirement for filing a tax declaration during the last three months of 1975," said Paul Nienderker, IRS district director for Kentucky. "Taxpayers are generally required to file an estimate if they owe the IRS more than \$100 not covered by withholding. The estimates in this case are due Jan. 15."

"There is one exception to this rule," Nienderker said, "and that's when taxpayers file their returns and pay all taxes due by Feb. 2. In that case the final 1975 installment is not required; the amended declaration is not required nor is an original Jan. 15 declaration required."

IRS Publication 566, "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," available free from the Louisville IRS office, provides additional information.
