## Computer billing installed

Mrs. Stacy is one of several employees who began operational training Dec. 1. This machine, installed by ADP (Automatic Data Processing) Medical Services of Nashville, Tenn., will serve both the nursing home and the hospital. This "total hospital information system" provides the following operations: in-patient and out-patient accounting—all insurance charges are generated according to the benefit of the patient's particular policy which is already on the computer system.

system in the Common Insurance File, and a summary statement showing charges by departments and listing estimated insurance coverage is printed upon discharge or upon demand; payroll; accounts payable; general ledger; medical records; medical audit; and medicine admitting/transfer which enables either nursing home or hospital to admit a patient prior to arrival, and to preclude elective admission to reduce open beds. Information is fed into and printed out from Nashville via the computer within a matter of seconds. The office work load has been greatly reduced, and no one's job has been eliminated at either facility. Carlisle is one of six hospitals in Kentucky to install the ADP system. —Duncan photo

## Telephone users' excise tax lower

Telephone customers in Kentucky are paying less federal excise tax on telephone service as of Jan. 1, according to South Central Bell Manager C. A. Harris. "The tax reduction will mean a savings of roughly \$2,000,000 for our customers in the state," he said. "The reduction of federal excise tax on telephone services from seven to six per cent is the result of a Congressional act passed in 1973 which provided for the gradual elimination of the tax. The reduction will continue until 1985 when the tax is eliminated."

## Hunting seasons closings approach

FRANKFORT—Several of Kentucky's hunting seasons will soon close, the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources reminded hunters recently. The seasons for both ducks and geese will end Jan. 26, followed by the closing of rabbit and furbearer season Jan. 31. Hunting for quail and grouse will continue through Feb. 26.
