Millersburg sewer project gets EPA 'priority'

The Millersburg sewer project has picked up momentum with three developments that will move the city closer to completion of the new system. Millersburg's sewer project is high on the state's priority list. For funding, according to a letter from the Environmental Protection Agency received by Perry city manager David Jones Jones said that Millersburg is one of a few Bluegrass area communities to be placed on the priority list.

According to Mason, the city applied for the approximately \$200,000 funds for the project two years ago. The engineer estimated that the total cost of the whole project including the planning and construction stages, will cost about \$760,000, with the city picking up 25 percent of the tab since the grant will fund the project on a 75-25 percent matching fund basis.
