These recipes are just good to have in your cookbook. They are not related in any way but they are good.

BARBECUE SAUCE
1/4 cup vinegar
1/2 teaspoon Colman's mustard
1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper
1 teaspoon paprika
2 tablespoons brown sugar
2 tablespoons salt
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
1 tablespoon Tabasco (a little less if you don't like it too hot)
1 teaspoon black pepper
2 small garlic cloves, quartered
1 grated onion
1/2 pound of 1/4 lemon
1 bay leaf
Bring to boil and simmer over low heat for 20 minutes.

COOKED SALAD DRESSING
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
2 teaspoons sugar
dash of red pepper
2 tablespoons flour
1/2 cup vinegar
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup vinegar
To dry ingredients, add egg, butter, water and vinegar mixture very slowly. Cook over boiling water stirring constantly until mixture thickens. For a more tart flavor, add a bit more vinegar.

CHEESE OMELET
This is a simple and easy dish to serve for lunch or Sunday night supper. Good served with tomatoes, hamlet, sausage or you might like to add different seasonings to the omelet like whole kernel corn, sautéed onions, mushrooms or dried ham. I'll give you the basic recipe starting with 6 eggs which should serve about four. From there you will have to judge for yourself as to amount—depending on number of persons to be served.
6 eggs
1/4 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
dash of pepper
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 cup grated medium sharp cheese
Combine and beat with fork: milk, egg yolks, baking powder, and pepper. Combine egg whites and salt and beat until stiff but not dry. Melt butter in 12-inch heavy skillet at medium heat. Fold yolk mixture lightly into the egg whites. Pour into skillet. Cover with lid. As omelets begin to
