

Cubs win Little League tournament and season

The Cubs beat the Reds Monday night, July 19, 7 to 5 to capture the Little League Tournament Championship. In the final game of the season which was played Monday, July 19, the Cubs beat the Athletics 12 to 5 to win the Little League championship for the season. Prior to that game the Athletics and Cubs were tied for the championship with eight wins and one loss each. The Cubs, coached by Billy K. Anderson, finished with a 9-1 record for the season while the Athletics, coached by Marshall Stone, ended their season with a record of eight wins and two losses. According to the Cubs coach "the

championship game in the tournament was a hard fought battle and took an extra inning to pull out the victory." Friday's games were rained out and the tournament started on Saturday when the Cubs were victorious over the Athletics 22 to 0 and the Reds snapped the Cubs' 23 to 10.

In the semi-finals the Cubs defeated the Blue Jays 17 to 1 and the Reds put the Dodgers out of competition with a score of 17 to 10. At this point the easy play was over for the Reds and the Cubs as it took seven innings rather than the usual six for the Cubs to capture the championship.

The Little League All Star team has been picked and a picture will appear in the Mercury at a later date. The All Stars are scheduled to play at Camargo next Tuesday, July 27.

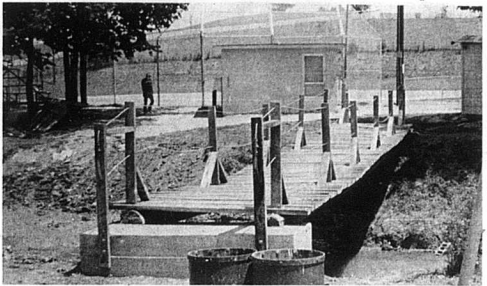
County Judge Pro Tem can perform

FRANKFORT—The county judge pro tem, appointed by the county judge and serving at his discretion, can perform the duties of the county judge only under specific circumstances, according to an opinion issued by the Kentucky Attorney General's office. The county judge must be absent from the county or unable or disqualified to perform his official duties because of sickness or other valid reasons before the judge pro tem may assume the duties. However, the county judge pro tem may act for the county judge on the fiscal court in his absence. The opinion, delivered by Assistant Deputy Attorney General Charles W. Burman, noted that the judicial functions of the county judge are county judge pro tem will end on the first Monday in January 1978. The non-judicial functions, including their work on the fiscal court, will continue except where changed by legislative action.

Correct 'tv headache'

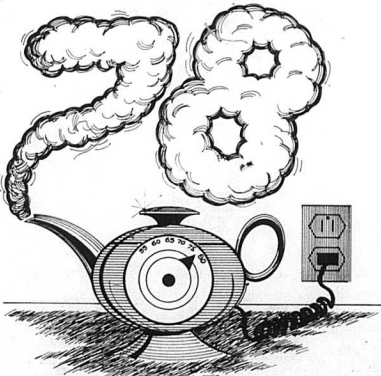
The Kentucky Society for the Prevention of Blindness offers a few tips on sensible TV-viewing for armchair political campaign watchers.

You cannot "wear out" your eyes by looking at television. Normal eyes will not experience fatigue from TV if the picture is in sharp focus, and you sit as far from the screen as visual comfort permits. If your eyes feel tired, give them periodic rest intervals away from the screen.

The most common cause of "television headache" is an improperly-adjusted set. Avoid placing a burden on your eyes by keeping the picture in crisp focus at all times. Place the set directly in front of the family's favorite chairs at about eye level.

Keep a regular lamp burning in the room while the TV set is on. Never watch it in a completely darkened room because the contrast between the bright screen and the dark background is tiring for the eyes. Position the lamp so it is not reflected in the screen.

Historians to receive honorary degrees

RICHMOND—Two historians and authors from Lexington will receive the honorary degree of doctor of letters at Eastern Kentucky University's summer commencement Aug. 5.

They are Dr. Thomas D. Clark, for many years historian at the University of Kentucky and since 1973 distinguished professor of history at Eastern, and Dr. J. Winston Coleman Jr., former engineer and building contractor. They will be presented the degree by EKU president Dr. Robert H. Martin

who will make the main commencement address. Clark, who headed the UK History department from 1942 to 1966, and has also served as its distinguished professor, has written such popular historical books as "Pills, Petticoats, and Flowers," "Frontier America," "A History of Kentucky," and "The Southern Country Editor." He is an authority on the American frontier and southern history.

Coleman, who engaged in engineering work in New York, Kentucky and other states, was organizer and president of Coleman and Davis, Inc., general contractors and builders at Lexington, 1924-36, and was owner and operator of Winslow Farms, 1936-66. His books include "Stage Coach Days in the Bluegrass," "Slavery Times in Kentucky," "The Beaucaire-Sharr Tragedy," and "Famous Kentucky Deeds." He wrote the introduction to the "History of Nicholas County."

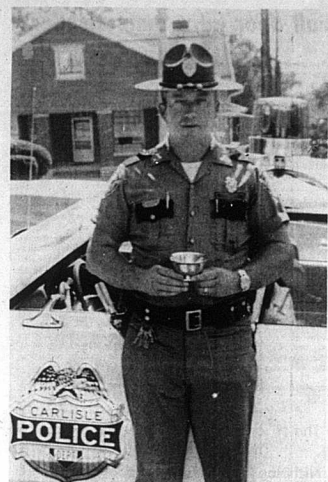
The commencement will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the Van Puseur Pavilion on the EKU campus.

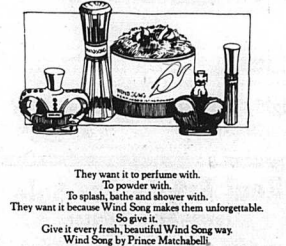
Earlywine wins award
