Educational grants available

FRANKFORT—The Kentucky National Guard has begun accepting applications for educational tuition assistance, and will grant eligible applicants as much as half of their tuition expenses at state-supported institutions.

A spokesman for the state Department of Military Affairs explained that the Educational Encouragement Fund established for the Guard by the 1976 General Assembly should enable many Guardsmen to further their education and should greatly enhance recruiting

capabilities. Adjutant General Richard L. Frymire said, "We are very pleased when the General Assembly established this fund." The legislation permits a fund board to approve up to 50 per cent tuition reimbursement to Guard members who attend a state-supported university, community college, or vocational school. The department spokesman said that applicants may be seeking either an undergraduate or graduate degree on a full or part-time basis.

Nolls attend American Veterinary Medical meet

Dr. James A. Noll attended the 112th annual meeting of the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) in Cincinnati July 19-22. More than 5,000 people attended, making the meeting the largest veterinary meeting held anywhere in the world.

Veterinarians attending the convention participated in scientific sessions focusing on large and small animal medicine, environmental and public health, regulatory veterinary medicine, laboratory animal medicine, research and avian medicine. Through these sessions veterinarians learned about the latest advances in preventing

and treating animal health problems. The AVMA Women's Auxiliary, the National Conference of Student Chapters of the AVMA and 50 allied veterinary medical groups held meetings in conjunction with the AVMA meeting.

Mrs. Noll accompanied Dr. Noll to Cincinnati and attended the meetings of the AVMA Women's Auxiliary.

information regarding the owner's name, address, etc.

The primary purpose of the project is to assist the Nicholas County Property Valuation Administrator in establishing more complete and accurate property identification records. However, there are a number of other benefits which will accrue to Nicholas county property owners. Each property owner will be able to see a plot of his real estate drawn according to scale and compare the size, shape, location, and boundaries with other properties in the area. Both public and private utilities such as electric, water, and gas companies can have ready access to records of property ownership for right-of-way purposes. Attorneys, real estate agents, and others will find the records helpful in determining the location, ownership, and boundaries of parcels and in abstracting titles.
