## Huddleston sponsors bill

**WASHINGTON**—The Senate has passed and sent to the House legislation sponsored by Senator Walter (Dee) Huddleston to require an appraisal of the nation's land and water resources as well as development of a program to enhance those resources.  
Such an appraisal would be conducted through the local Soil Conservation Service offices, under direction of the secretary of agriculture.  
The secretary is further required to transmit to the Congress the initial appraisal of land and water resources as well as an update each five years.  
"At a time when we are maximizing production, we must make every effort to conserve and protect the land resources of this nation," Huddleston said.  
"Furthermore, the world has entered a new era of food scarcity. This has meant spiraling prices, shrinking grain supplies, and regional famines in many nations. This will bring a demand for even greater production."  
"This raises the question: Will there be enough land to feed our citizens and to meet the export demand. That's why we need the appraisal called for under this legislation. We need an assessment of just what the land resources needs will be and a set of policies to meet those needs."
