The Nicholas County Historical Society will hold a bi-centennial reception at the Library on Sunday, July 4 from 2-4 p.m. to celebrate the publication of the History of Nicholas County—the county's lasting memorial to the Bicentennial.

All interested persons are invited to attend the reception. Over 300 histories were ordered at the pre-publication price. The histories are now selling for \$21.00 (including tax). The History was written and researched by many volunteers. It contains 18 chapters with over 100 pictures. The Family History chapter lists approximately 100 submitted family histories. The Cemetery Chapter lists over 100 county cemeteries, including the Carlisle Cemetery. Other chapters include Prehistoric Nicholas County, County Sections and Post Offices, Revolutionary War, Civil War, World Wars I and II, Slave Days, Industry, Agriculture, and Outstanding Nicholas Contians.

The History was the outgrowth of Nicholas County's 175th Anniversary, 200th Birthday Celebration in 1974. Almost every organization in the

county and many individuals were involved in some way in the '74 celebration.
