

### Youth beef show to start

DISTRICT YOUTH BEEF HELPER SHOWS UPCOMING

The 1976 Kentucky 4-H and PFA Beef Helper Shows, featuring some \$10,000 in premiums and awards, will be conducted around the state during the week of June 21-26.

The district shows, which number six this year, are designed to allow youngsters who are enrolled in 4-H or PFA Beef Helper Projects to evaluate their animals in a true show situation and learn fitting and showmanship.

The 1976 shows will be held at Princeton, Glasgow, Elizabethtown, Stanford, Georgetown and Flemingsburg. They will be conducted one day at a time.

Each of the shows will open at 8:45 a.m. local time with the competition getting underway at 9:00. Classes will be offered for Angus, Hereford, Shorthorn, Charolais and Charolais Cross, and Crossbreeds. Chuck Drizin of Morehead and Dale Lovell, University of Kentucky, will be the judges. After the show ring contest is held, a showmanship contest will be held with divisions for both junior and senior showmen.

In the second game of the night the Dodgers defeated the A's by a score of 15-4. Tom Moreland pitched the winning game for the Dodgers and Jackie Wells got the loss for the A's. Nine hits were made by the Dodgers: singles from T. Allison, G. Williams, Tom Moreland and J. Anderson (3); doubles from Tim Moreland, J. Smoot and T. Markland. Getting hits for the A's were M. Mattox, T. Banta, M. Boykin and K. Giltner who got a double. The A's were plagued by errors, making 8 while the Dodgers made only two and turned one double play.

Both games Friday were full of action with high scores and very close victories. The A's almost came out of their slump but failed to keep their big lead in the last inning as they fell to the Senators 17-16. Timmy Banta started the pitching for the A's but was relieved in the fifth by M. Mattox who got the loss. The Senators also had pitching trouble as M. Ruddle was relieved by Jeff Handolph in the fifth and finally by Chris Keney who got the win.

The A's had good hitting, getting 10 hits altogether including an inside-the-park home run by M. Boykin with two runners on base. Other good hits were: singles—M. Mattox, T. Banta, J. Wells, M. Ruddle, and T. Hunt; doubles from M. Mattox, M. Colern, M. Ockerman and also a triple by M. Boykin. The Senators got 7 hits, all singles from P. Garrett (3), M. Colern, M. Ruddle (2), and T. Reid. They got their winning run in the last inning with 2 already out which made for a very exciting game.

The second game was just as exciting and full of action as the Giants and Dodgers battled for a tied position for first with the Senators. Tim Moreland tried to get the game for the Dodgers but had to be relieved by Todd Allison in the fourth inning. Moreland gave up back to back home runs in the second inning by Bobby Dailey who hit one over the fence at dead center field and Mitch Sargeant who hit one over the fence into the tennis court in left field. These were the second and third out-of-the-park home runs this year, the other made by Moreland himself. The Dodgers came back in the third and tied the score but couldn't hold the Giants as they opened up a good lead until the bases loaded when the Giants made a couple of errors. This tied the score with the Giants coming up.

With two out and one on base, the Dodgers intentionally walked B. Minton bringing M. Hatton up to bat. Hatton got the winning hit and P. Letcher came in for the run needed.
