

Two work experience courses planned

Land laboratory to be built on school farm

Two new work experience courses are being planned for Nicholas County High School next year.

The first—and most unique—is a land laboratory which will make use of the farm around the school property, owned by Nicholas County Schools.

Superintendent Elder said that he and Principal Cobble Lee began dreaming of other work experience projects which could make use of the remainder of the 36 acre farm which was not being used otherwise—estimated 36 acres.

Immediate plans call for a pond to be built, and a bird sanctuary. Ground will be planted on the sanctuary to attract birds. Later plans are to plant 60-100 fruit trees which will naturally attract animals.

Land on one side all the way to the cemetery and on the other side out to Brookshire's and down to back of Emery Clark's Used Cars.
