Tornado victims to be helped by contributions

The Kentucky Division American Red Cross announced today that it will accept contributions for tornado victims affected by the 41 tornadoes reported March 29 throughout the United States.

Red Cross shelters are providing housing for the disaster victims, and emergency workers and victims are being fed by Red Cross volunteers from mobile canteens and fixed centers. Twelve mobile disaster vans from surrounding states were immediately dispatched to Mississippi and Arkansas to join those already sent from Jackson and Little Rock to the disaster areas. Hundreds of Red Cross volunteers and staff were involved in administering assistance.

In Canton, Miss., located about 20 miles north of Jackson, a tornado slashed a 200-yard path for a two minute period, leaving in its aftermath 40 dead, more than 150 injured, 200 dwellings and 100 mobile homes destroyed or damaged. Red Cross shelters were opened in a National Guard Armory and local school, and Red Cross volunteers were busy feeding victims and workers.

The hardest hit area in Arkansas was an eight block area in Cabot, a Baptist community in central Arkansas, 20 miles northeast of Little Rock. Red Cross survey information there revealed five were killed, 19 injured seriously, and more than 50 were treated and released at hospitals. Two Red Cross shelters were opened in Cabot to house those left homeless after 30 dwellings and mobile homes were destroyed or damaged. A Red Cross relief center was set up immediately and has been operating in the First Baptist Church there. Red Cross mobile canteens are feeding victims and workers in Cabot also.

The 41 tornadoes that touched down March 29 included 21 in Arkansas, 12 in Mississippi, two each in Tennessee, Oklahoma, and Kansas, and one each in Illinois and Missouri. This is the largest number of tornadoes to occur on a single day since the devastating April 3 tornadoes of 1974, at that time Kentucky was one of the hardest hit states.

Contributions for the disaster victims should be made payable to the American Red Cross and marked for "tornado disaster victims".

First Christian Church to burn mortgage at special service

The congregation of the First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) will mark an historical milestone in the life of the church in a special worship service on Sunday, May 9. At the close of the morning worship the mortgage papers will be burned to symbolize the payment in full of the debt against the church property located on Catherine Street in Elizaville.

The First Christian Church was organized April 25, 1860 and the first meeting was held May 4, 1860 at Concord, a historical Christian Church site three miles south of Carlisle. Later that same year, a house was purchased at 454 Locust Street. Following renovation it was used as a church building by the congregation. Ground breaking ceremonies for the new church building were held March

22, 1970.
The one and one-half acre site was a gift from Mr. and Mrs. Russell Alexander. The church was dedicated Nov. 15, 1970. Rev. Neil Thompson was the minister.

The burning of the mortgage papers will mark 18 years of progress since the forming of the congregation.
Rev. Ben Pumphrey Jr. is the minister.

Doran to be honored at Alumni Banquet

MOREHEAD—Morehead State University President and Mrs. Adron Doran will be recognized at the annual Alumni Banquet Friday, May 7, for more than 22 years of service to MSU, Kentucky and the nation.

Scheduled at 6:30 p.m. (EDT) in the Ballroom of the Adron Doran University Center, the event is sponsored by the Alumni Association and is open to the public.

Dr. Doran was appointed to the MSU presidency in 1954, becoming the seventh man to hold the office. Now into his 22nd year, he has served more than three times longer than any of his predecessors.

Mrs. Doran, always active as the First Lady, became a full-time staff member in 1969 by founding and directing the Personal Development Institute.

Both have received international recognition for their achievements at MSU. Dr. Doran accepted the Horatio Alger Award in 1971 and Mrs. Doran the 1974 Citation Award of the International

Association of Personnel in Employment Security (IAPES).



Morehead State University President Adron Doran, dean of Kentucky's public university, chief executive, Monday announced his retirement effective Jan. 1, 1977. The 66-year-old educator asked the MSU Board of Regents to release him from the remainder of his existing four-year contract which expires June 30, 1978. He has served 22 years in the post.

Water a must for everything

FRANKFORT—Water is a must for everything—for drinking, growing food, washing, working and playing. Because it is a necessity, the state division of sanitary engineering attempts to make sure all water is safe.

According to Nick Johnson, director of the division in the Kentucky Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection, the review and approval of plans for public water supplies is one way of insuring water safety.

In addition, the division conducts a water sample surveillance program to interpret the bacterial and chemical contents of the water.

Johnson said that the sanitary engineering division last year evaluated 21,465 bacteriological and 725 chemical and physical samples. In areas where drinking water standards aren't being met, the division staff can follow up on the water quality problem with technical assistance.

When not involved with water inspection, division personnel are usually bringing public water supplies into compliance with state laws.
