

# Kay's Kitchen

This week is going to be "Special Dessert" week. These recipes are good for special occasions or to just give yourself a treat. Some are light and good to serve after a filling meal. Some of them are rich and good anytime when you can blank your mind to colors.

The first two recipes I always make at the same time. They are both light and each one calls for 1/2 cup cream, whipped—and since whipping cream comes in an eight ounce carton or bottle (1 cup), I make both desserts. You are in luck, though, because of these recipes were in my family and were made many times, I always remember what to do with that 1/2 cup cream that was left—now you know because the nicest thing of all, one of the desserts is used in the freezer and will keep for weeks.

**LEMON DESSERT**  
Cook 3 eggs whites and juice of one lemon, grade the lemon rind—it should make about 1 tablespoon. Anyway, the rind of one lemon is enough, and 1/2 cup sugar will thicken, stirring almost constantly. Cool.  
Beat 3 egg whites until stiff, add 1/2 cup sugar. Beat 1/2 cup whipping cream. Fold cooled lemon mixture into beaten egg whites then fold in whipped cream. Line ice tray with crushed graham crackers. Cover tightly with foil. This, if frozen hard can be sliced. However I have found it is more flavorful if not so cold. So upon it into a stemmed sherbet glass. You may add a spoon of prepared whipped topping if you wish. Serves 6 to 8 depending on size of sherbet glass.

**PIE FILM FLUFF PARFAIT**  
1 package raspberry jelly  
1 cup hot water  
1 cup syrup from a No. 2 1/2 size can of purple plums—(Note, use only best grade canned plums)  
Mix, then chill until thick, and beat until light and frothy. Fold in 1/2 cup cream, whipped, and the plums cut up. Should be a cup—but more won't hurt. Pile lightly into parfait glasses. Should serve 8. If your parfait glasses are a larger size, put 1 tablespoon of prepared whipped topping in bottom of glass and also top with topping. Refrigerate until serving time.  
Don't let the jelly and use prepared whipped topping instead of whipped cream. It just won't work. You will be disappointed.

**CHOCOLATE PUDDING**  
Mix together: 1 cup flour (sift before measuring), 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons melted butter, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Pour in greased baking dish (medium sized casserole). Cover with 1/2 cup white sugar. 5 rounded tablespoons cocoa. Over this pour a cup of water. Bake one hour in moderate oven, 350 degrees.  
A chocolate sauce forms in bottom of baking dish and a cake forms at top. Cover with whipped cream and serve hot. Delicious but rich!

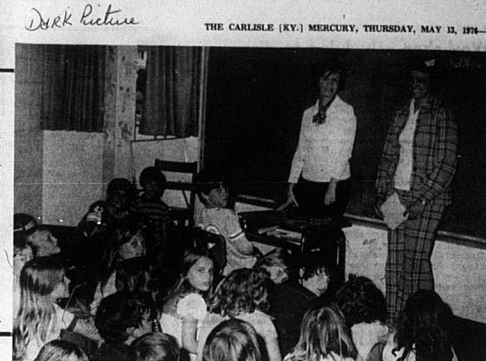
